Leaves but results remained in rose culture by pruning the plants in stakes, leaving only four new stalks to each bush, and spraying with a light solution of lime-sulphur, about twelve to one. Cultivate around plants with plenty of fertilizer, and plenty of irrigation when this time of year down to ten roses are in bloom.

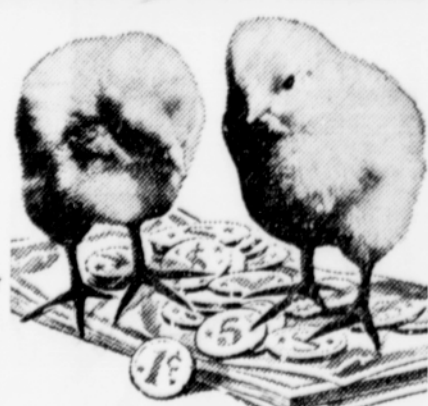
