March 1 Deadline For Dog Licenses

One of the main orders of business across the counter in the county clerk's office during the past week has been the issuance of dog licenses. Saturday, March 1, is the deadline for securing licenses to avoid paying a penalty of \$1.

With license applications coming in at the rate of 150 to 200 per day, the county clerk's office passed the 2000 mark early this week, but there is a wide gap to close if last year's record of 3900 licenses before the March 1 deadline is to be reached.

Licenses are required for all dogs in the county eight months old or over. The fee is \$1 for males and spayed females and \$1.50 for females.

The Washington county dog control fund, which is created through license fees paid claims totaling \$1231 during 1940 for stock and poultry killed by dogs, Frank Schumacher, board chairman announced last week. Heaviest losses reimbursed were for sheep and goats, a total of 170 claims in this classification having been paid.

Hillsboro Council To Meet Tuesday

Two items of business on street improvements are the only "sure" matters for consideration of the city council when that municipal administrative body meets Tuesday night for its regular March session.

A hearing is scheduled on the proposed improvement of South Eighth avenue from Baseline to Oak and from Walnut to the S. P. tracks, but no objections are foreseen as obstacles to an ordinance ordering the work done. The project would construct macadam road and curbs from Baseline to Oak and from Walnut to Maple and macadam without curbs from Maple to the railroad tracks.

The other street improvement item will be apportionment of costs for sidewalk construction on North Ninth from Main to Lincoln.

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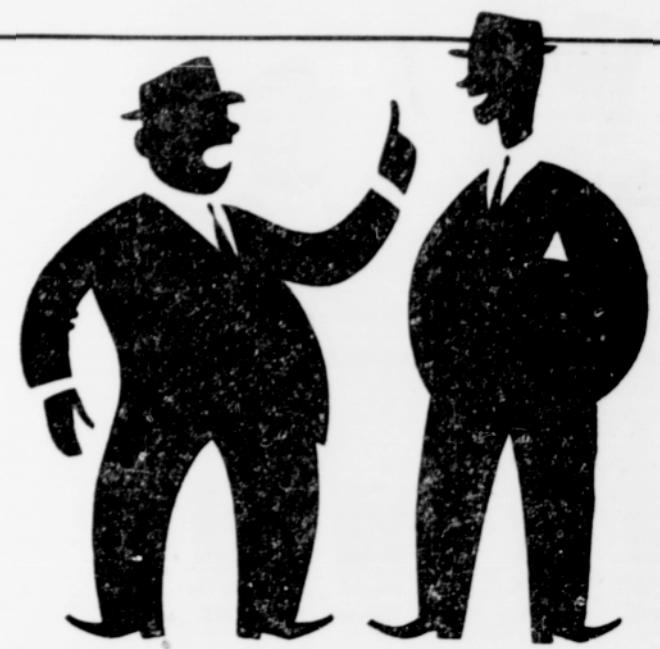

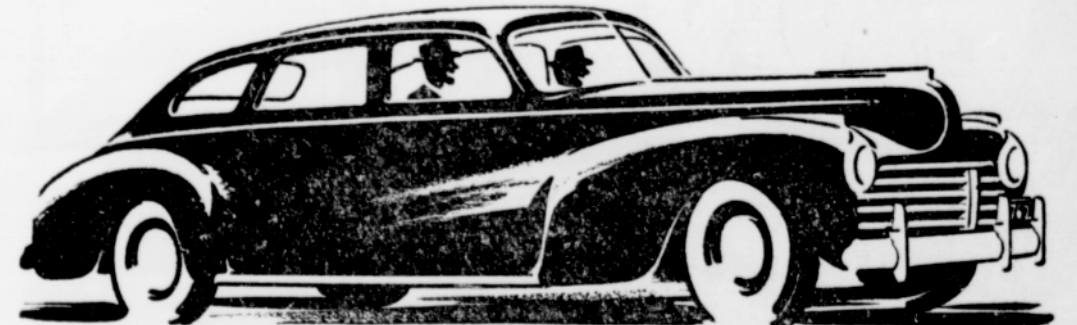

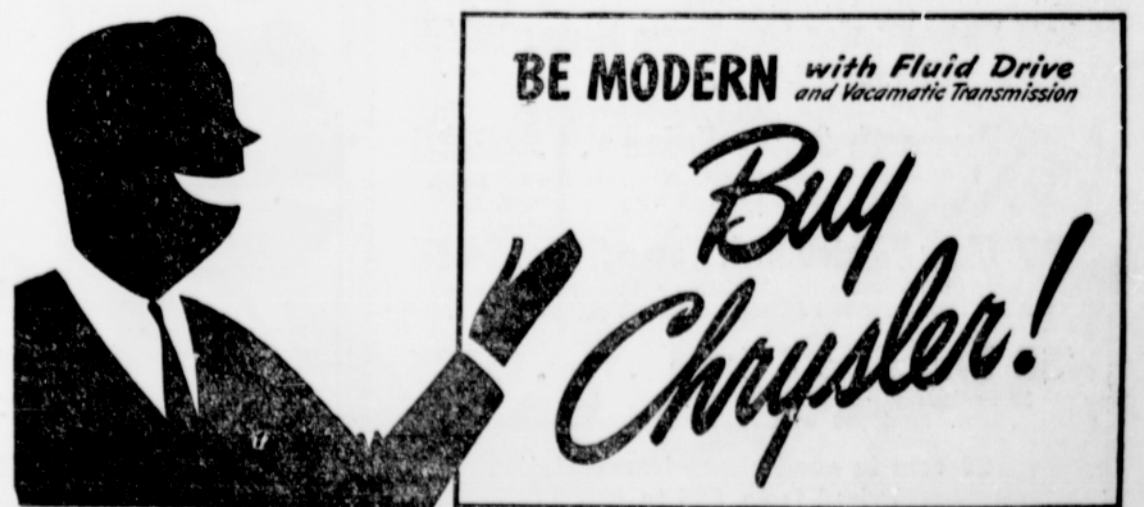
