Thursday evening, March 20, is the date set for the grade school opera "The Galloping Ghost."

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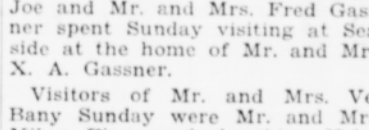
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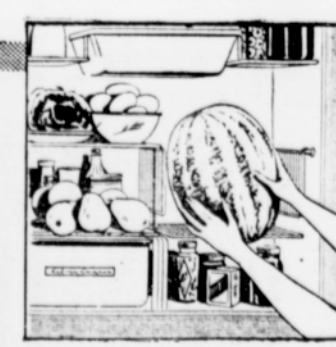


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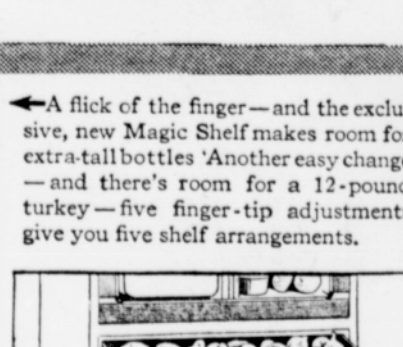
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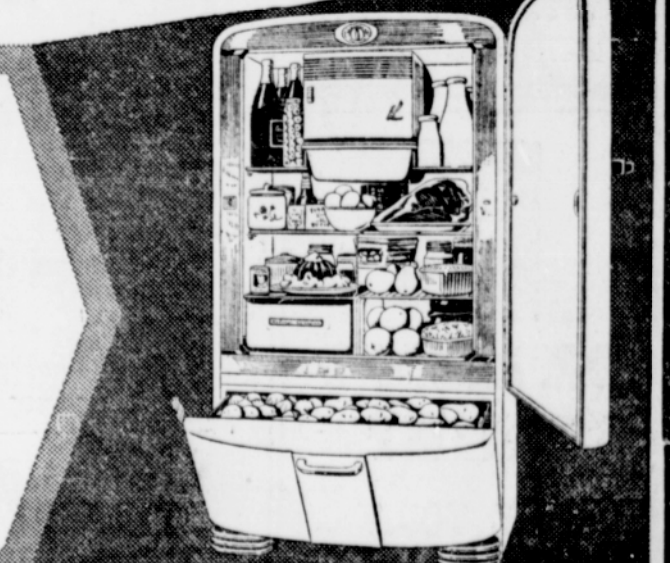
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
