## Balkans Near Explosion as Reds Take Hand

Another lighted match was thrown into the Balkan "powder keg" Wednesday in the form of an ultimatum by Soviet Russia demanding that Nazi-dominated Rumania hand over certain Black Sea naval bases to her.

Monsieur Nazi troops continued to pour into Bulgaria through Rumania, massing on the Greek frontier and a million reserve troops of Rumania spread out along the Russian frontier. Turkey's diplomatic leaders were quoted in assurances of faith to her alliance with the British despite last-minute Nazi attempts to split the two countries.

At Washington, senate leaders formed a bloc to oppose any amendment to the lease-lend bill which would confine activities of American troops to the western hemisphere after Secretary of State Hull warned that passage of such an amendment would give the "green light" for vigorous aggression in the Orient by Japan.

**Legion Oratory Contest to Be Held Wednesday**

The Washington county division of the national American Legion oratorical contest will be held Wednesday, March 12, at Beaverton, according to J. W. Poynter, county chairman. All high school students in Washington county are eligible and it is hoped that all high schools will have entries. Poynter said.

The contest was held last year in Hillsboro by the Toastmaster club here as host. This year, the Beaverton Kiwanis club will be host. The contest is divided into two sections, one for prepared orations and the other for extemporaneous talks.

The Hillsboro American Legion picnic is offering gold medals to the winners of each section and ribbons to all entrants. The county winners will be sent to a regional contest which is to be held prior to March 22. Washington county is one of 16 counties in the northern Oregon region.

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## Driving School At Hilhi Offered By State Program

Students of the Hillsboro high school will be offered the opportunity of learning to drive an automobile in a modern safety driving school when a seven-week course will be started here March 12, under auspices of Earl Snell, secretary of state. It was announced this week. Snell sponsors these schools as a part of his state-wide traffic safety program.

Students 15 years of age or older are eligible to enroll, registrations to be left at the high school. Each pupil must furnish his own car, but no driver's license is required for the course. Cars must be driven to and from the school by licensed operators, however.

Any adult who may wish to take the course may do so by reporting at the high school at 1:15 p. m. Wednesday, March 12, according to Chauncey DelFrench, traffic safety representative making local arrangements for the driving school.

**Arrest Clears Burglary Series**

Twenty-two recent burglaries in Washington and Multnomah counties were cleared up this week through confession of Mervin W. Burnett, 20, of Medford, who has been in the county jail here since his arrest Saturday by State Officer George Aitken.

According to Sheriff John Connell, Officer Aitken caught Burnett in a daylight burglary attempt near Beaverton. Charged with burglary and jailed, Burnett was later questioned about other recent prowls cases after a search of his room in a Portland hotel uncovered virtually all the loot obtained from prowls in this county.

The series of burglaries in Washington county date back to February 4, Sheriff Connell said. Burnett was released from the state penitentiary only a short time before that, records revealed.

**Arrest Follows Perjury Charge**

Helen Smith, 31, Vancouver, Wash., who recently was granted a \$356 judgment in a civil suit against C. Henry Nelson of Hillsboro, was arrested Thursday on perjury charges contained in an indictment returned by the last county grand jury.

Appearing with counsel before Circuit Judge R. Frank Peters on Friday, the Vancouver woman entered a not guilty plea. Bail was set at \$500 cash.

Alton Alfred Hurst, who was jointly indicted with Logan Mead a year ago on a burglary charge and later paroled, was arrested on Friday, a warrant for parole violation this week and halted before Circuit Judge Peters. His parole was continued by Judge Peters on motion of defense counsel.
