

Human Relations Film Study Showing Set

Mrs. Buena M. Maris, extension specialist in family relationships, will be at the Cedar Mill Grange hall March 13 at 8 p. m., to lead a panel discussion of the film, "Alice Adams," which deals with problems of human relations. These Hollywood films have been cut so that the running time is about 35 minutes. The films come from the commission on human relations, Progressive Education Association of New York City. All discussion groups are open to everyone interested in seeing how these films can be used in teaching human relations.

The human relations films have been edited from outstanding photographs. The selection of films used depended on an analysis of their essential similarity and their pertinence in dealing with issues that are of concern in human relations education. Some deal with parent-child relations, some with husband-wife relations. Others reveal problems of personality adjustment. A few show the relation of the child to his home. Several present characteristic adolescent problems. All center the attention of parents on the human situations, problems and issues with which all of us deal in the conduct of our day.

Family life education is more and more including penetrating studies of human needs and personality growth as well as the physical growth and economic aspects of child care. The film is a means of bringing before students and parents, a common experience in seeing and hearing human beings in action. From this common experience they can discuss the human needs, the causes of behavior and the universality of the problems the film presents.

The film to be used in Washington county, March 13, is the film "Alice Adams," which depicts a girl who is the daughter of a family which is in financial straits. The film shows the girl's struggle to cope with the family situation where there isn't money enough or social backing adequate to meet the adolescent's desire for social prestige. Alice Adams works out her problems in a way that she can without the complete understanding of her parents. The film offers the basis of good discussion of our youth and some of the anxieties parents face as children reach the age of cutting the apron strings.

In a panel discussion it will not be the intention of the group to solve all the problems or give all the answers, but rather to gain some understanding of what is involved.

Mrs. Maris appeared at a similar meeting in Washington county, on February 11, at Aloha. Anyone interested in the discussion method of dealing with family problems is invited to attend this meeting, according to Kathleen McCrae, home demonstration agent.
