From a movie location in Arizona this week came William H. Hipple Jr. to spend a vacation with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hipple of Hillsboro route 3. The junior Mr. Hipple, who is 22, is a writer for a Hollywood publicity firm contracting with independent producers. He has been making his home in California's cinema colony for the past two years.

At the present time, Hipple's company is doing publicity for Howard Hughes' forthcoming western vehicle, "The Outlaw," starring Jane Russell and Jack Beutel with Thomas Mitchell and Walter Huston in the cast.

Prior to acquiring his publicity job, the Hillsboro man led a rather colorful life finding his niche in the world of journalism. He started in this profession as a youth of 15 writing for a newspaper in Tacoma.

He attended journalism classes at the University of Washington and the University of Puget Sound, was employed for short periods by the Seattle P-I and the United Press at Seattle, later went to Washington, D. C., attended George Washington University for a time, took a job with the United Press again and was published several years.

He was employed for the Trans-radio Press service in the national capital.

In 1937, he was sent to London for special reportorial work and returned to the United States a year later to try his hand at writing news broadcasts for the radio in New York City. After a short season in this line, he went to work for a public relations firm and in 1939, after a visit with his folks here, went to Hollywood on a hunch, landing the job which he now holds.

Among well known movie stars for whom he has done publicity are Ronald Coleman, Dick Powell, Carole Lombard and Loretta Young. His job entails writing about 60-80 words of publicity per month. He had just completed publicity material for a press book on "The Outlaw" when his vacation period started.

His brother, Jack, is with the 41st division of the army at Camp Lewis. A young sister, Margaret, is enrolled at the B. W. Barnes school here.

Life and habits of Tahiti, island in the Society group in the south seas, were discussed before Rotarians here Thursday by R. E. McNeal of Portland, who with Mrs. McNeal recently lived in Tahiti for sometime. Mr. McNeal was Southwestern Pacific agent here for several years before his retirement.

The McNeals made the trip to Tahiti in an old freighter out of Los Angeles. The island, which is owned by the French, is due to volcanic eruption. Tropical foliage abounds and many different kinds of tropical fruits are available, 21 different kinds of bananas growing wild, 100 kinds of nuts and many varieties of oranges.

There is no crime and no divorce among the natives, declared the speaker. The people are fine and are not quarrelsome. Foreigners cannot go into business or endeavor to make money in any way and must report their every move so that the French government knows where they are at all times.

The McNeals lived on a black sand beach, where the picture "Mutiny on the Bounty," was filmed.
