The NYA health program in Hillsboro is well under way, according to a report received by Ivan G. Munro, state administrator, from Dr. Arch W. Daack, state health consultant of the project.

Complete physical appraisals are being given Hillsboro youth by Dr. F. T. Burke, Washington county health doctor and member of the state health consultant's staff. The NYA health program, approved by the Oregon State Medical society, is designed to improve the physical fitness of young men and women eligible for or working on local NYA work experience projects.

The idea behind this statewide project is promotion of the health of all youths through education with a view to establishing the highest standards of physical fitness attainable for Hillsboro young men and women to help strengthen the nation's vital defenses. Munro said. To accomplish this objective, all available resources of the NYA and local facilities are being used.

Burglar Draws Five-year Term In Penitentiary

A penitentiary term not to exceed five years was drawn by Marvin Wilbur Burnett, 20, of Medford, on a burglary count to which he pleaded guilty before Circuit Judge R. Frank Peters last Wednesday.

Arrested by state police two weeks ago, Burnett admitted providing 24 houses in Washington and Multnomah counties during recent weeks. Much of the missing property from burglarized homes was found in Burnett's hotel room in Portland.

Police records identified the confessed house-prowler "as an ex-convict. He waived grand jury indictment when first brought into court here.

Rodent Control Meetings Set For March 27, 28

Rodent control demonstration meetings are scheduled for next Thursday and Friday, March 27 and 28, according to Palmer Torvick, assistant county agent. At these field meetings effective methods of controlling the various rodents will be demonstrated and discussed. Roy Fugate, district agent of the division of predator and rodent control of the United States Department of Interior, will assist with these demonstrations.

The complete schedule of these meetings is as follows: Fred Langer farm, 1/2 Six Corners near Sherwood at 9:30 a. m., Thursday, March 27; Henry Hesse farm, at the Tualatin river bridge at Scholls, 1 p. m., Thursday, March 27; John Mulley farm, one mile south of Laurel, 2 p. m., Thursday, March 27.

Meetings for Friday, March 28, will begin at Fred Jossy's near the Germantown road. Other meetings for that day will be held in the Blooming, Schefflin, and Kansas City communities. Exact time and places of these demonstrations on Friday will be announced next week. Emphasis at these demonstrations will be placed on the methods and timeliness of the various applications and control measures as well as some discussion of the allowance made by the AAA program in providing payment for rodent control. The 1941 program lists rodent control as a supplementary practice with a payment equal to 150 per cent of the value of the materials purchased.

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Roosevelt Talk Stiffens Greek, Turkish Attitudes

Tension in European and Asiatic war theatres increased during the past week as a succession of events piled up new factors in a world war which threatens to blaze into new fury at any moment.

Acting as a fan for the war flames as well as a check-mate for aggressive plans of the Rome-Berlin-Tokyo axis was President Roosevelt's radio talk Saturday on the United States lease-lend bill in which he told the American public and listeners at more distant points that the world need harbor no doubts now but that this nation will increase and still increase its war production effort until "total victory" over the dictator nations is achieved.

Calts for Sacrifice

In a vein of psychology reminiscent of Winston Churchill's famous "blood and sweat" challenge to the British people, President Roosevelt declared that taxes in this country will mount higher and even higher and that sacrifices will be made by every American citizen, but that we cannot relax our activities in favor of the democracies until the victory goal is reached.

Additional stiffening for attitudes of Greece, Turkey and possibly Yugoslavia was supplied by British action in landing seasoned troops on Grecian soil from a constant stream of transports shuttling back and forth across the Mediterranean. Little comment was heard from Berlin as news was released that 100,000 British troops had landed on the continent, an act which Adolph Hitler had previously warned would be met at every turn with Nazi opposition.

Troop Figure Uppe

Late reports from Athens set the total number of British troops now in Greece at 200,000 and a goal of 300,000 fighters was reportedly the high command's aim.

These factors were seen as underlining reasons for Yugoslavia continuing refusal to allow Nazi troops to cross its borders to the Greek frontier. The status of Yugoslavia was still in doubt but some reports held the Yugoslavs were contemplating alliance with Britain and Greece.

In the Orient, Japanese statesmen were "marking time" in their Siamese thrust pending developments in Europe.

Meanwhile, Britain reported new victories in the campaign to smash Mussolini's east African empire, the latest being capture of the key Ethiopian city of Jigjiga, and American war supplies were beginning to arrive in Britain and Greece under terms of the lease-lend act.
