Aloha-Huber School Bond Election
For New School Set for March 29

ALOHA-HUBER—The school board has set Saturday, March 29, at the school house from 2 to 7 p. m. for a vote on the district's proposed new school building. The proposal provides for bonded indebtedness of \$31,000 for the purpose of building, reconditioning and equipping a new school building and an gymnasium on condition that a WPA project be granted by the federal government.

Total approximate cost under private contract would be \$34,000, but by procuring WPA labor it is estimated that the cost to the district will be only \$31,000.
