Drivers' Licenses To Cost \$1.50 Under New Legislation

When Oregon's 490,000 drivers renew their drivers' licenses for the 1941-1943 license period, they will pay \$1.50 for their new licenses instead of one dollar, as in the past. Current licenses expire June 30 and new permits will be required on the first of July.

Under this act passed by this year's legislative session, a fund to be known as "the motor vehicle accident fund" is established in the state. Along with the one dollar fee for each driver's license, the secretary of state is required by the new law to collect an additional fifty cents which goes into this fund. The fund will be used to pay hospitalization expenses for indigents injured in automobile accidents.

Requirements Same

There has been no change in the examination requirements for driver's licenses this year, according to the secretary of state's office. Drivers holding current licenses may renew without submitting to any examination this year. Those who were not licensed during the current period, 1939 to 1941, will be required to take the law examination, the eye test and the drive test. Persons over 70 years of age, regardless of whether they hold current licenses or not, also must take these tests.

Application forms for renewals of state licenses about May 1 and will be distributed through various sources including sheriffs, chiefs of police, license examiners, or they may be obtained by writing to the secretary of state's office at Salem. The 1941-1943 drivers' licenses will not be valid till June 15, however.

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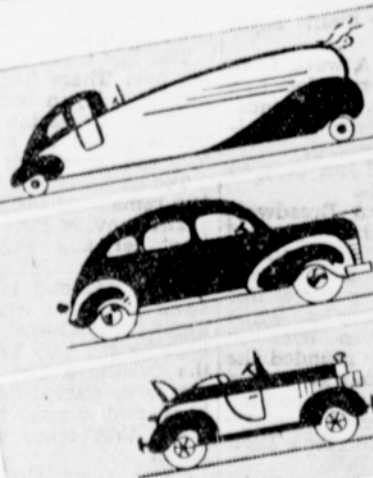
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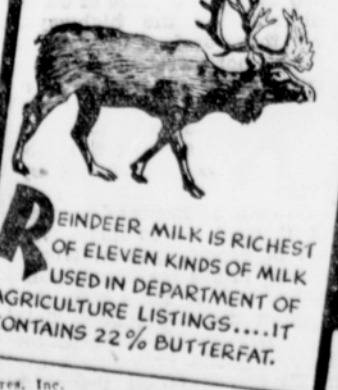

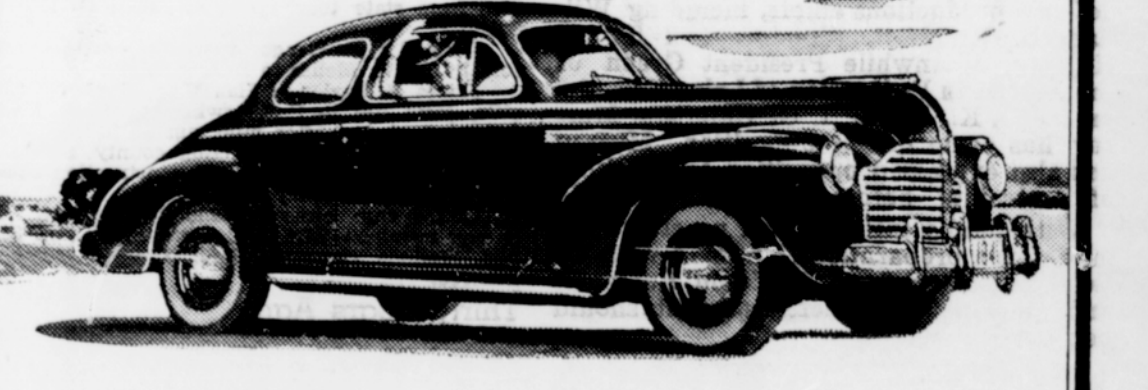
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
