Services Held At Newberg For Mrs. Shook

CHEHALEM MOUNTAIN—Funeral services for Florence Shook, 66, were held Saturday at the W. W. Hollingsworth chapel in Newberg. Rev. W. F. Morris of Amity, a former pastor at Mountain Top, officiated and interment was in Noble cemetery.

Florence Ornduff was born on Chehalis Mountain March 23, 1875, and lived her entire life here. She was married to Otis Whitmore 1890. He died October 22, 1899, leaving her widow with three small sons, Florence Whitmore and Frank Shook were married in 1904.

Mrs. Shook died March 19 after having been ill in bed since suffering a stroke August 15, 1932.

She is survived by the widower, two daughters, four sons, Mervin and Elmer Whitmore and Ray and Frankie Shook, all of Chehalis Mountain, except Elmer Whitmore of Twin Rocks, and one grandchild, and one great-grandson. Preceding her in death were two sons, Lloyd Whitmore, who died in active service in the World war, and Wayne Shook. Mrs. Shook is also survived by two sisters, and one brother, Mrs. Jane Johnson of Kings Valley and Mrs. Rhoda Cady and Peter Ornduff, both of Chehalis Mountain.

Missing Girl Found by Police In Capital Park
