Coast Guard Seeks New Enlistments
In line with the national defense program now in progress, it is announced that the U. S. Coast Guard is further increasing its personnel. Due to this expansion many enlistments are to be effected. One hundred or more men per month are to be enlisted through the Seattle recruiting office, located at room 37, Federal office building, according to Chief Boatswain H. O. Nielsen, recruiting officer.

Recruits from this area will be trained at Port Townsend, Wash., where the service maintains an up-to-date training station. Only single men between the ages of 18 and 25 are to be considered at this time.

Those registered under the selective service act may still enlist in this branch of military service. Over a period of years a person may attain the rating of a chief petty officer, warrant officer or chief warrant officer. Top pay for a chief petty officer is \$137.50 per month, for a warrant officer \$247 per month, and a chief warrant officer may attain possible top pay of \$416 per month.
