

Large Representation At Church Council

Constituting a record-shattering attendance, 17 churches were represented at the Washington county council of churches meeting held Monday at Forest Grove, according to J. N. Torbet, president.

One hundred and seventy-five churchmen, not including members of the a capella choir, who rendered several numbers on the entertainment program, attended the meeting. Main talks of the meeting were delivered by Dr. W. C. Giersbach, Pacific university president on the topic "My Father's Business," and Dr. M. A.
