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Alaskan Service Is Offered to CCC Enrollees

Oregon and Washington youths enrolled in the CCC have been offered an opportunity for a year's service in Alaska, according to word received recently at Vancouver barracks district headquarters.

Information has been received that 60 replacements are needed for Company 927, Annette Island air base project, Ketchikan, Alaska. In order to permit all enrollees to avail themselves of this opportunity, ninth corps area junior companies are being canvassed for volunteers. Because of possibilities of obtaining defense employment in Alaska, the list of men desiring such service is expected to be long.

Requirements Listed
Junior enrollees selected for the Alaskan service must have had three months' service with the C. C. C., must be 15 years of age or over and must agree to re-enroll for an additional six months at the conclusion of their present service.

A number of selected men sailed from Seattle on March 26.

Annette Island is described as being contrary to the popular conception of Alaska—namely, ice and snow. Winters at the location of the far northern CCC camp are said to consist mostly of long rains. The Alaskan camp has most of the comforts of modern civilization, including regular showings of sound motion pictures.
