Hillsboro Tops List of Seal Sale Donations

A complete list of community contributions to the 1940 Christmas seal sale was compiled and released this week by Mrs. Harry Morgan, seal sale chairman. The total in 1940, marking inauguration of the seal-sale type of campaign, was \$2,494.67, as compared with \$1,432.32 in 1939, a gain of over 74 per cent.

Hillsboro's donation was by far the largest of any community in the county. The total of contributions here was \$545.04, more than 250 per cent increase over the \$198.18 given in 1939. Forest Grove citizens contributed \$323.20 as compared with \$209.61 the year before and Heaverton gave \$260.28 as compared with \$143.37.

Other large contributions by communities were: West Union \$217.20, Cornelius \$79.00, Dillley \$22.90, Banks \$23.76, Tigard \$34.90, Tualatin \$39.95, Hill \$23.89, Reedville \$21.65, Meacham \$24.30, Hawk Creek \$29.10, Helvetia \$21.30, North Plains \$23.40, Timber \$33.91, Witch Hazel \$23.05, McKinley \$20.50, Sherwood \$61.45, Cooper Mountain \$23.20, Verbena \$24.90, Metzger \$47.61 and Aloha-Huber \$76.76.

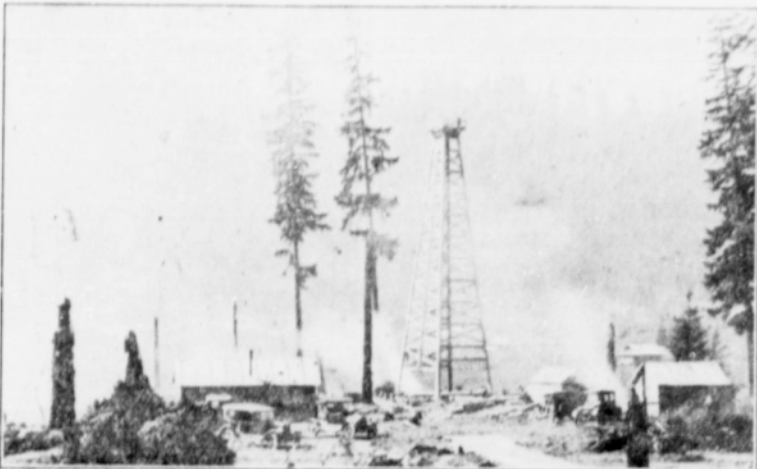
