Cigarette Tax Referendum Starts

The cigarette tax bill passed by the last legislature would be referred to the people on the next general election ballot in November, 1942, by a petition filed with the state department last week by G. J. McPherson of Portland, secretary-manager of the state retail grocers' association.

A total of 13,900 signatures of registered voters must be obtained by June 13 on referendum petitions soon to be circulated in the state if the cigarette tax law is to be voted. If this number of signatures is not obtained by June 13, the tax will become law on June 14.

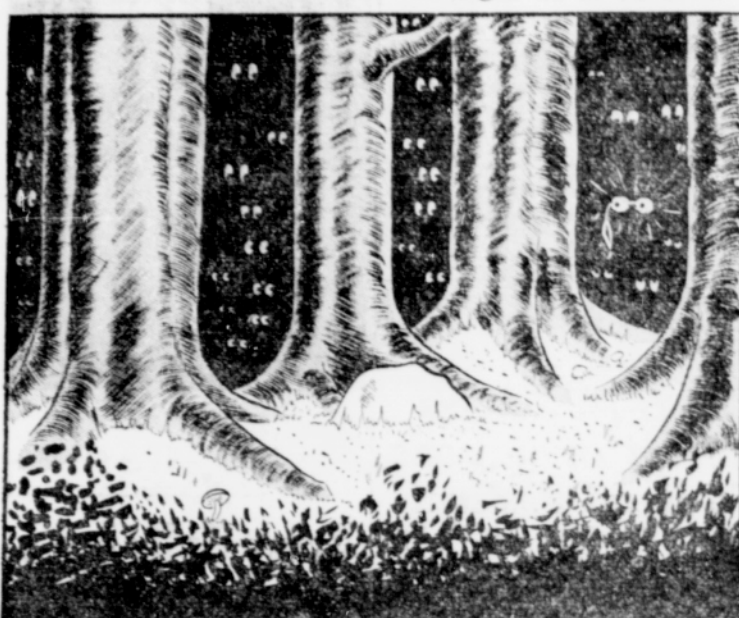

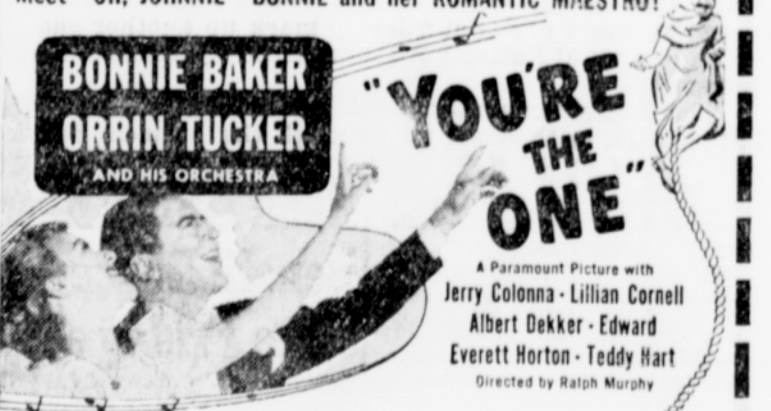
