

## Statement Answers Questions on Aloha-Huber Water District Vote

In response to many questions being asked by residents of the proposed Aloha-Huber water district concerning the election on that issue to be held Wednesday, April 23, the following informative public statement was issued this week by a committee of 13 men in the district:

To the citizens of the proposed Aloha-Huber water district:

The undersigned committee desired to give you the following fact about the water district election to be held next Wednesday, April 23, 1941.

The present movement to secure an adequate domestic water supply for our community was taken up by a committee of citizens from the Huber Commercial club a number of months ago. The committee was at once enlarged to include representatives from all parts of our community and the enlarged committee immediately began a detailed study of the water supply. They obtained competent legal and engineering aid and advice to determine the situation and what can be done regarding it.

**Supply Adequate**

This committee found that the present domestic water supply is inadequate for the number of persons residing in this territory, and further found that there was no guarantee of continued service. Also, that no definite action could be taken without a legally organized water district. They then contacted as many persons as possible throughout the proposed district as to whether or not they felt some action should be taken in the matter.

The committee spent considerable time trying to determine what properties should or should not be included in the district, if one is formed, having always in mind the best interests of the community as a whole. The final result was the circulating and filing of petitions with the county court, asking that an election be held upon the question of incorporation, in order that the people might determine for themselves as to whether or not they desire to take further steps toward securing an adequate water supply.

**Purpose Stated**

This election will be solely for the purpose of incorporating a municipal water district and to select five commissioners to act as the legal representatives of the people. The term of one commissioner will expire each calendar year and his successor will be elected by the people. The commissioners serve without pay.

It is the hope of this committee to bring to this territory Portland's famous Bull Run water. The preliminary engineering survey has shown that there is an adequate supply of Bull Run water available, if the proposed district decides to go directly to Portland for it, and at a cost within our ability to pay.

If the people of the proposed district desire, other sources may be available at a lesser cost. Exactly what any supply will cost each of you depends to a very large extent on how many of the possible users will take water if made available to them.

**To Vote on Program**

If the formation of a water district is authorized at this election, a definite financial program will be submitted to the people of the district for their approval or rejection at a later election called by the duly elected board of commissioners.

It is the hope of this committee that every registered voter within the proposed water district will vote and express his opinion upon this question, as we believe it is one of the utmost importance, for it affects every member of the community. Every registered voter residing within the district for a period of 90 days preceding the election is entitled to vote, whether he owns real property or not.
