Peril for U. S. Seen In Any War Outcome

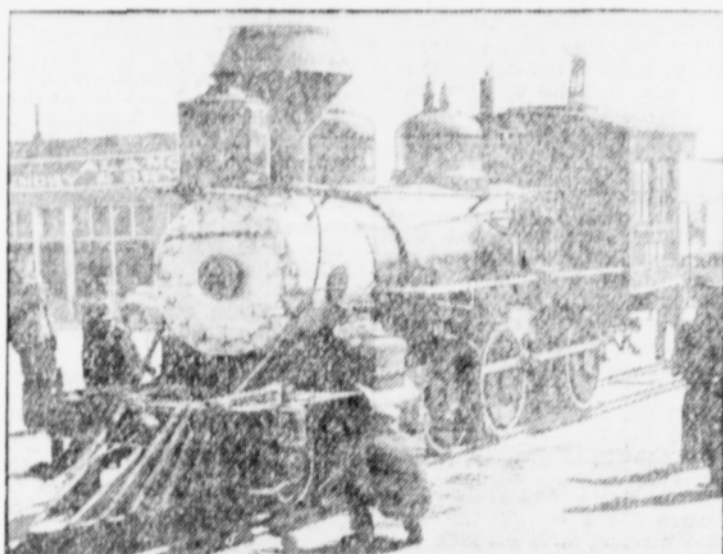

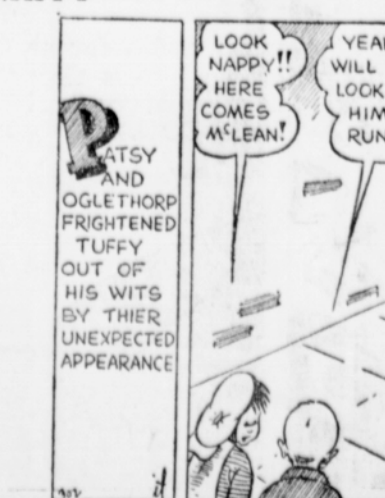

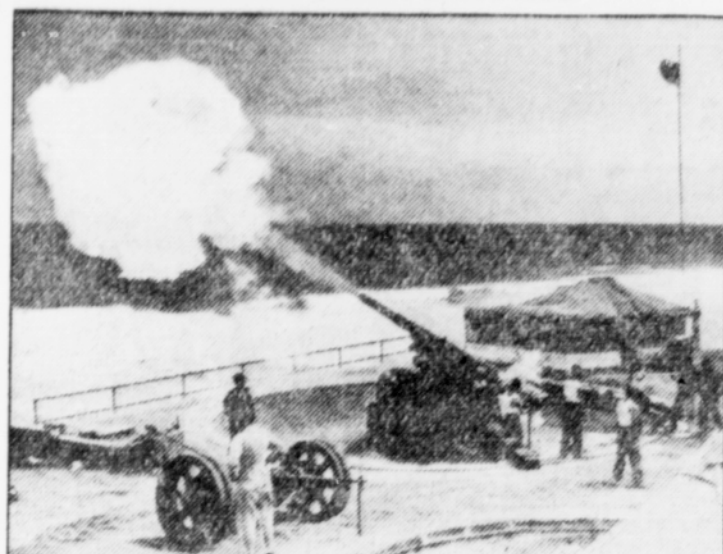
