Starvation for Conquered Held Aim of Hitler

"The microphone is mightier than the cannon."

Such might will be the modern version of an old adage "The pen is mightier than the sword" as adapted by Adolf Hitler to his ambition for subjugation of Europe and then the world, according to Dr. Frank Munk, professor of economics at Reed college and former member of the Czechoslovakian cabinet, who spoke at a joint meeting of the Hillsboro and Forest Grove Rotary clubs in Forest Grove Wednesday noon.

Dr. Munk, whose book "Economics of Force" has been well received, said that the present European struggle might have been very different if the small nations had been aware of Hitler's real aims of conquest. It is not only Hitler's intention of conquering these countries, Dr. Munk said, but of totally crushing them by starvation and any other inhuman means which can be contrived.

The speaker said he was in Poland at the time Nazi military might swept over that nation and that the insidious plans of German occupation were quickly noticeable there. On the day before Poland's fall he said, anyone could have purchased as much food as he wished, but on the day after German penetration, food was virtually unobtainable.

Those among conquered peoples who do not bend to the Nazi will be broken by absolute enslavement and a disciplined Nazi system of dictator power wielding the whip, Dr. Munk stated.

The talk was met with austere silence and keen interest by the Rotary club audience.

The all-day conference, one of four to be held in the series, will open at 9:45 a. m.
