The National Editorial association Monday announced through its head office in Chicago, Ill., that the Hillsboro Argus, top winner in the NEA general excellence contest for weeklies last year, was one of six weeklies to earn honorable mention for editorial page excellence in 1941 competition.

The Argus thus adds another laurel to a collection which has grown to considerable size and significance through the year. Awards won by the Argus include selection as Oregon's best weekly in 1939 and 1936, All-American weekly eleven listing in 1939, honorable mentions in NEA newspaper production contests, 1934, 35, 36, 37, in NEA general excellence, 1933, 38, 39; third place in two NEA contests in 1937, general excellence and best editorial page, and second in classified ad page contest in 1939.

Activity when the crisis is past, Mayor Riley predicted, and cities will be more financially able to push their pet projects then if they remain financially cautious through the trying period to come.

Businessmen and city officials should be cautious of their current ramifications of the national defense picture, the speaker warned. There are many individuals and self-styled organizations without proper appreciation of our national defense emergency that will misrepresent themselves as connected with the national defense program in order to promote their selfish interests, he said. One such organization in Portland, apparently with sufficient endorsement, proceeded to organize a women's defense group and arrange for uniforms to be worn by the women. Investigation proved the "organization" had no national sponsorship and that one sole objective was the selfish goal of selling uniforms at exorbitant profits.

Draft Considered

Business men can also strengthen and speed the wheels of na-

tional defense by preparing in advance for the draft demands that will be made on their employees, it was pointed out. In addition to the selective service inroads in all ranks of employed, the national government in its imperative need for skilled hands in civil work connected with national defense production is now drafting both men and women workers whose skills make them more valuable to the nation than to their employers.

Such drafting of skilled labor requires that substitute workers acquainted with key jobs in private enterprise be trained and kept in readiness for the time when they may be called upon to fill an emergency vacancy, Major Riley declared.

In the absence of Mayor Hugh S. Rogers, who left Monday morning for an indefinite period of observation and treatment at the Veterans' hospital in Portland, Councilman and Acting Mayor E. A. Griffith was chairman of the day, and introduced the mayor from Portland.
