Hamburger Illegal

Three of the official samples of hamburger picked up in March by the state department of agriculture foods division were found to be illegal upon analysis, department chemists report. The hamburger contained sulphites. Also, seven of the 138 samples of butter analyzed were illegal because the fat content was below 80 per cent. The department found also three illegal soaker solutions and one illegal chlorine compound.
