

### Hillsboro Editor Retained as NEA National Director

W. Verne McKinney, editor and co-publisher of the Hillsboro Argus, now attending the 56th annual convention of the National Editorial Association at Jacksonville, Fla., has been re-elected to the national board of directors for a second term, it was announced here Friday in a press release from the convention city.

As the national director of the N. E. A. traveling the greatest distance to the convention, McKinney delivered the response to an address of welcome at the opening session of the convention. In this talk he called attention to the vital part newspapers can and must play in strengthening our democracy for the present emergency.

**Tells on Advertising**  
Later, in his capacity as chairman of the N. E. A. advertising committee, he urged immediate steps be taken to make the town paper stronger in the national advertising field. It was McKinney's contention that smaller papers are "much more effective in molding public opinion than metropolitan newspapers."

The following standards were outlined by the Hillsboro editor as representing a course of action for meeting the needs of small papers. Membership in the A. B. C. establishment of a department in the N. E. A. to list one order, one bill and check play to attract national advertisers, elimination of "troublesome little details" in each office, adoption of a uniform rate structure, creation of a more uniform invoice system and a method to control free publicity.

In Hillsboro numerous congratulations to Mr. McKinney were being accepted in proxy by his mother, Mrs. E. E. McKinney, acting editor in her son's absence. Mr. and Mrs. McKinney and son Walter are expected to return home in about two weeks.

of redemption values printed on the face of the bond.

**Limit Set**  
To spread investments widely among all the people in America, a limit of \$5,000 has been set on the amount of these bonds to be bought by any one person in one year. The bonds are in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1,000, all of which are sold for 75 per cent of their maturity value and all of which mature in ten years.

For larger investors who can afford to purchase up to \$50,000 worth of bonds a year, the treasury department has issued two additional kinds of defense savings bonds, but these will be sold only through banks and by direct mail from Washington, D. C. They are intended for associations, trustees and corporations, as well as individual purchasers.

**Low Denominations**  
For the smaller investor who wants to buy a government bond on an easy payment plan, the post office will have a new series of postal savings stamps, at 10, 25 and 50 cents, \$1 and \$5. Each purchaser of any savings stamp will receive a free gift of charge an attractive pocket album in which to paste his stamps until he has enough to buy a \$25 bond or one of higher denomination. Thirty million of these albums are now being prepared.

The cover design of the album is in color, featuring a United States battleship and an eagle bearing the American flag. On the back cover is a painting of the minute man statue, a figure who symbolizes the American citizen ever alert in defense of his country. The inscription is "America on Guard."  
Secretary Morgenthau said that even a boy or girl who saved 10¢ to buy a savings stamp would help the country. He added that "you can safeguard your own money and your own future, while helping the national defense, by buying United States savings bonds now."

levy was collected if any conclusion can be drawn from the figures, it would tell of improving finances for taxpayers, those well versed in figures declare.

In other departments of Herring's survey, there is still more indication of improvement. On or before the first quarter date, 8,782 tax receipts had been issued. This is the largest number of receipts for any year in the survey period, comparing with the following totals for preceding years: 8,208 in 1940, 7,639 in 1939, 7,300 in 1938, 6,877 in 1937, 6,004 in 1936 and 4,713 in 1935.

Moreover, the total of delinquent payments plus interest collections, \$97,763.23, is larger than in any of the preceding six years, comparing with \$93,495.91 in 1940, \$83,866.19 in 1939, \$83,337.44 in 1938, \$104,737.01 in 1937, \$92,715.99 in 1936 and \$71,994.70 in 1935.

Rebates show the same trend, collections by March 15, 1941, totaling \$16,327.73, again the largest corresponding total in the seven-year period, other rebate totals ranging on down to only \$9,589.13 in 1935.
