Special stress was laid on child welfare in this problem and that a great responsibility rests with the communities, schools, and camps in getting these people adjusted to a normal or as near normal life as possible.

Plans will be made during the summer for the approaching year's work, the first meeting of which will be held October 14 in the school house at Durham.
