

County-Wide Music Festival Starts Today with Crowning of Queen

Grade school musicians and singers from every hidden hamlet in Washington county will bridge the county with song today (Thursday) and Friday, with participation in the annual county-wide music festival.

More than 100 school districts in the county will send choral groups and musicians to 16 pre-designated communities for programs in observance of National Music Week (May 4 to 11), according to plans outlined by the county school superintendent's office.

The 16 community festival centers are Hillsboro, Beaverton, Tigard, Sherwood, Tualatin, Banks, Gaston, North Plains, Tinsler, Laurel, Garden Home, Cornelius, Reedville, Dilley and Gales Creek. Committees in charge of programs at these centers have been appointed.

The county committee in general charge of the 1941 music festival is composed of Clyde Hopkins, Sherwood, chairman; Marguerite Doehrer, Cornelius; Marjorie Warknick, Cornelius; route 1; Edward T. Taggart, Garden Home; Frances N. Hargrave, Tigard; Mrs. C. D. Chamberlain, North Plains; and Mrs. William B. Chandlee, Sherwood route 4.

Poynter in Charge
At Hillsboro, the program is in charge of J. W. Poynter, chairman; Lucille Fisher, Hildah Hanes, Florence Withycombe and Harriett A. Ford. The festival here will be held at 1:30 p. m. in the high school auditorium.

Schools that will gather here are: West Union, Gravel Johnson, Heywood, and Hillsboro.
Feature of this year's festival at Hillsboro will be the crowning of the queen, Alice Lawrence. She will be attended by four princesses, Marian Jacobson, June Seimour, Beverly Quaring, Norma Lou Kroeger, and their escorts. Music fair will be Billy Baldwin, Mr. Poynter will act as prime minister. Each school will present two special numbers. Those already scheduled include a trio, a quartet, tap dance, and a piano solo.

Schools Invited
All parochial schools in the county have been asked to take part in the festival center nearest them. County public schools have been assigned to designated centers but any school preferring to join another center may do so.
