Army's New Blitz Buggy



Engineers make test runs through hilly and brush-covered terrain with midjet reconnaissance car. The United States army has a new blitz weapon of its own in a 1700-pound midjet reconnaissance car. It is capable of 55-mile per hour speed, carries a machine gun and a crew, or a quarter-ton load. Huge cargo planes now in production for the United States government can swallow up four or five of these midjet trucks, fully equipped, and deposit them in the battle zone ready for immediate action. Some of these cars have four-wheel drives. All are equipped with twenty-two Timken bearings to provide trouble-free action of the vital moving parts.

Japanese Comply

Chief spokesmen for the Japanese growers, many of whom were confused as to just what action was being taken at the meeting, were Y. Shigeno, Cornelius route 1; Edward Nijima, Pumpkin Ridge, and S. Sato, Portland route 3. Sato, speaking for the Japanese growers after they had gone into a "huddle" in a room adjoining the main chamber of commerce, announced they were desirous of whole-hearted co-operation with white growers and that they would abide by the picking price set.

One Japanese grower who had already advertised a picking price of 1½ cents plus ½ cent bonus explained that he had done so through misunderstanding and that he would establish a 1½-cent picking rate in his fields with the rest of the growers.

Labor Supply Discussed

Some growers expressed concern over the slow start of registration by berry pickers but there was a general feeling that an influx of harvesting hands will be seen in the near future and that no acute labor shortage will develop.

According to County Agent Cyrus, the berry crop this year promises both better quality and increased yield per acre over last year. This will mean more money in the pockets of pickers, it is pointed out.
