Other matters to be discussed at the 4-H club leaders' meeting include making plans for the annual county picnic and other summer activities.

Closed Season Order Issued By Fire Warden

Cecil Kyle, district fire warden, this week issued the following notice of closed season in Washington county forests starting May 15:

During the period of each year between May 15 and December 31, which hereby is designated the closed season, it shall be unlawful for anyone to set on fire, or cause to be set on fire, any forest land, grass, grain or stubble, either his own or the property of another, without first securing a written or printed permit from the forestor or a warden.

On and after January 1 of any year or during any part of said year it shall be unlawful for any person to carry on a logging operation of any kind, within one-eighth of a mile of forest land or range without having first obtained a written permit so to do from state forestor.

Tools Required

On and after May 15 everyone conducting an operation as stated above shall maintain at landings of such operation in good condition for fire fighting purposes only, a fire tool box containing at all times fire tools sufficient to equip each employee in the operation.

And all trucks transporting forest products shall equip each truck with not less than a two-quart fire extinguisher, and fire tools, one shovel, one hatchet, and one ax, all in good serviceable condition and ready for use at all times.

All snags shall be felled currently with the operation throughout the year.

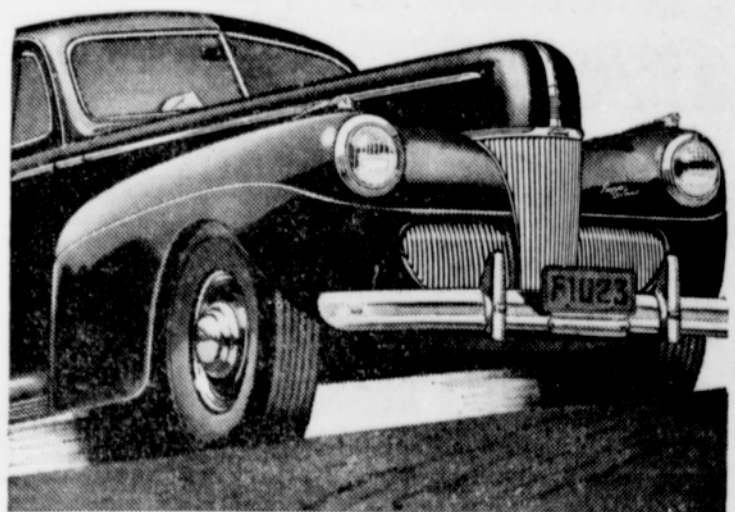

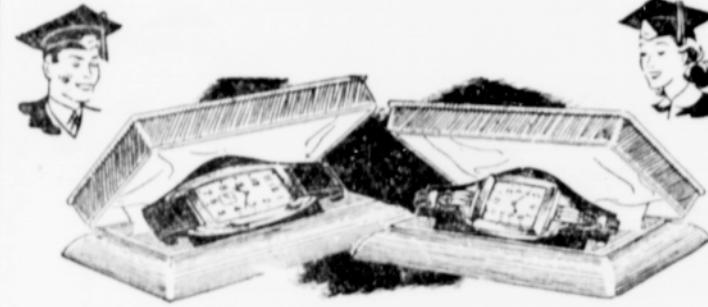

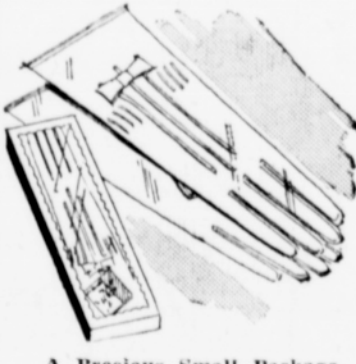
