

Programs Planned For Coming Year

Annual Program Planning Day for extension units of Washington county was held Thursday at the Hillsboro high school, according to Kathleen McCrae, home demonstration agent.

Forty representatives from the following communities submitted their requests as to program plans for the coming year: Cherry Grove, Dixie Mountain, Norwood, Hillsboro, North Plains, Tigard, Witch Hazel, Tualatin, Pumpkin Ridge, Laurel, Forest Grove, Cedar Mill, Rock Creek, and Glenwood.

The eight unit meetings outlined for the coming year follow:

Let's Have Fewer Colds, two meetings, by the agent.

Meeting Health Emergencies in the Home, two meetings, by project leaders.

Understanding Ourselves, two meetings, one by agent, one by study club leaders.

Planning the Home Grounds, one meeting, by agent.

"All-Out" Nutrition, one meeting, by project leaders.

A Statement of Safeway Policy
