

Softball Schedule Drawn; Opening Postponed

May 19 is New Starting Date

Postponement of the Hillsboro softball season opening from May 12, date originally set, to May 19, one week later, because of inclement weather which has delayed getting the new diamond into shape for play was announced by association officials Monday. A complete schedule of first and second half games for the two six-team leagues was released at the same time.

Setting of the later date for start of softball play will also allow more time for teams to get in condition, league officers decided at a meeting Monday morning.

Parade Planned
A parade of the 12 softball teams through Hillsboro's business section and traditional season opening ceremonies at the softball field are planned for the opening day. In addition to the two leagues of men's teams, there will be a four-team ladies' league under direction of Eleanor Bender.

Sponsors for three of these teams, Laurel, B. E. Maling and Howard's Highway Market, have already come forward, and a fourth team is being organized.

The season schedule, listing one county league and one city league game for each night of play, calls for first half league games starting May 20 and ending June 18 and second half games starting June 23 and ending July 30.

Beavers First In T. Y. V. Meet; Hilhi Second

Taking eight firsts and enough other places to pile up a total of 74 points, Beaverton's track and field squad ran away with first place in the T. Y. V. meet held last Wednesday at Beaverton. Al Bogue's Hilhi team took a convincing second place with 49 points.

Forest Grove came in third with 13 points. Newberg was fourth with 11 and Tigard held the last spot with 7 counters. West Linn and Sherwood were not represented.

Records Set
Three new T. Y. V. meet records were established by Beaverton winners. Selander with a record time of 1:53 in the high hurdles event. Miller, with a 4:45.2 time in the mile, and Roach with a new time of 2:44 for the low hurdles.

Hillsboro scored four firsts, two seconds, a tie for second, five thirds places and three fourths plus a tie for fourth place in addition to taking first place in the half-time relay. Hilhi men placed one-third in the shotput with Wells setting a top distance of 41 feet. Cooper was high point man for Hillsboro with two firsts, in the 100- and 220-yard dashes. E. Olson won the other Hilhi first with a discus throw of 110 feet 10 inches.
