Mrs. Grant Brown is remodeling and redecorating her home on Baseline road.

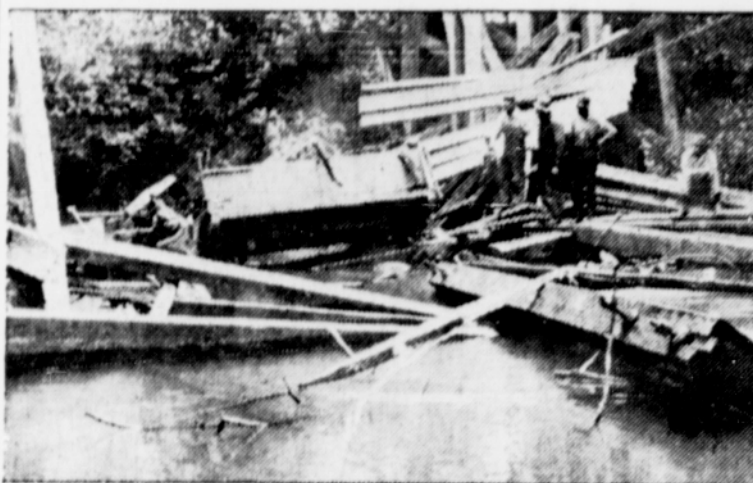

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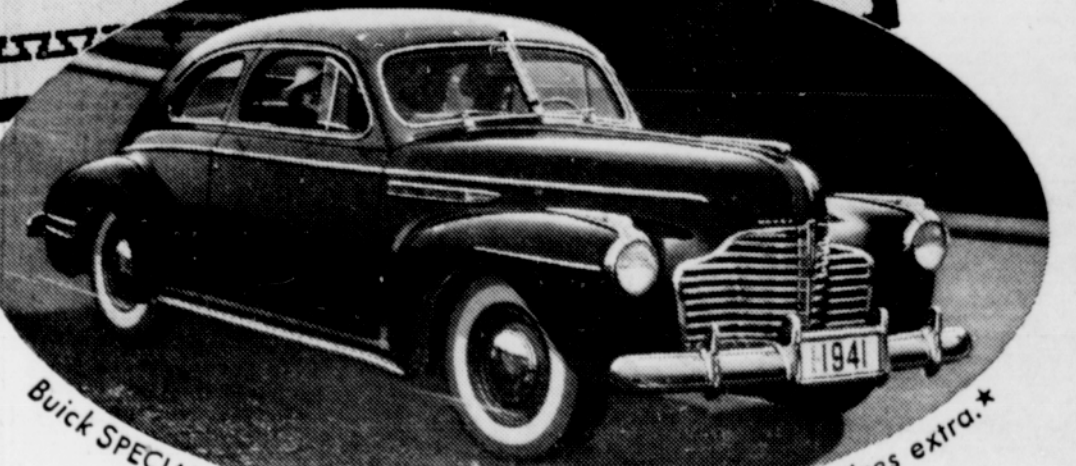
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
