

Red Cross Adds Assistants to Production Work

Mrs. Isabelle Warrens, county production chairman for the Red Cross, has been officially given assistant chairmen in the Hillsboro center and in Forest Grove, due to the increased work required in getting supplies made for war efforts, according to action taken last Thursday night by the County Red Cross chapter.

Mrs. Lillian Mares and Mrs. Lena Holm, who have received acting chairmen of the Hillsboro center and in charge of the work at the city hall, and Mrs. Carl Broderson, who has been Mrs. Warrens' assistant at Forest Grove, have been added to the list of county directors. Chairmen will probably be added soon in other sections.

The third quota to be sent to Red Cross headquarters by Mrs. Warrens, production chairman, contained the following knitted and sewed articles:

Sweaters for men, women and children, 12; socks, 12; mittens, 2; pajamas, 16; pajamas for men, 10; for children, 3; and for women, 16; dresses for children, 12; play suits, 12 and skirts, 14. Other material sent were approximately the same.

Besides the war relief garments, the committee has made from local material garments for disaster relief here, and gave out last week to fire sufferers, two sweaters, knitted quilt for baby, three baby dresses, knitted baby blanket and knitted robe, quilt, and a dozen diapers.

Work is now being done on the fourth quota which will be sent the last of this month, and a new shipment is coming which will be double any yet received. All ladies who are willing are requested to help as there is a greater volume of work to do.

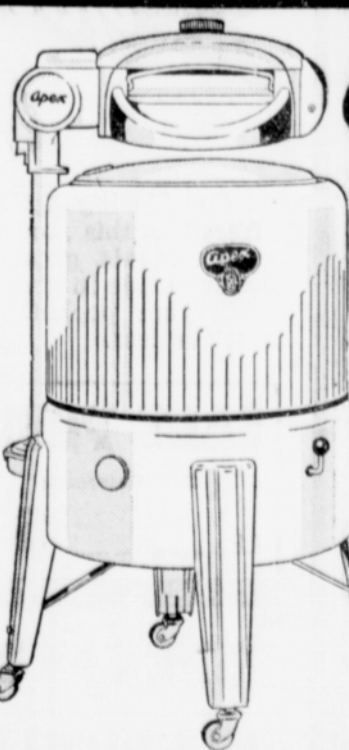
