

### Leaders Learn Mattress-Making At School Here

A school in mattress-making for community leaders who will supervise the FSA program in various Washington county centers was conducted Tuesday and Wednesday on the union high school grounds here.

Forty-five project leaders from nine county communities attended the school, which was in charge of Miss Lucy Lane, O.S.C. extension specialist in clothing, with Miss Kathleen McCrae, Washington county home demonstration agent, assisting.

**Cotton Ordered**  
Approximately 500 mattresses will be made in Washington county this summer by 100-income families. A carload of cotton has been ordered for these mattresses and the shipment is expected to reach here in mid-June. Mattress-making projects in the nine communities will continue through July and August.

For a nominal fee of \$1, each person or family participating in the program is given 50 pounds of cotton and 10 pounds of ticking, supplied by the surplus commodities corporation. Agencies co-operating in the program are the A. A. F. S. A., county court and the county agent's office.

### Seven Injured In Near Head-on Collision Here

### Two-Day Caravan Tour Planned for Sea Road Opening

A two-day triangular loop trip similar to that taken two years ago when the Wolf Creek highway was opened to public travel is planned for a caravan-tour opening of the Wilson River highway in late August or early September, according to tentative plans outlining in word reaching here last week from E. The tour would not only cover the entire Wilson River road from its Glenwood extremity to the coast but would take in the Neah-kah-nie mountain highway between Tillamook and Seaside and on the return trip would cover the newest link of the Wolf Creek highway from Sunset camp to Manning.
