

Torbet Retained as Church Council Head

R. N. Torbet of Hillsboro was re-elected president of the Washington county council of churches and all other officers were retained at the spring business meeting held in the Hillsboro Methodist church Monday evening.

Other officers of the council are Rev. F. S. Sibley of Scholls, vice president representing the ministry; Mrs. Rodney Cummings, Hillsboro, vice-president representing women's activities; Miss Dorothy Howes, Forest Grove, vice-president representing youth activities; and Miss Willy Nolan, Forest Grove, secretary-treasurer.

Approximately 125 church-goers representing 15 denominations attended the council session, which opened with a pot-luck dinner in the church basement.

Mrs. Walter C. Giersbach of Forest Grove, speaking on the topic "How Large is My Stewardship?" stressed the value of each individual dividing his time to give the greatest variety of interests and mental activity. With all these interests, time should always be found for regular short periods of meditation, she said.

Among other speakers was Ellis Marshburn, representative of the Home Missions Council of North America, who is now stationed in Hillsboro to carry out his work of promoting wholesome recreation and spiritual uplift. Marshburn, who came here only recently from Arizona, told the council audience of the lives and hardships of itinerant families of field workers.
