

Proclamation Issued For Poppy Day Here

Saturday, May 24, was proclaimed as Poppy Day in Hillsboro by a proclamation issued today by Acting Mayor E. A. Griffith. The mayor called upon all citizens to observe the day by wearing the memorial poppy of the American Legion and Auxiliary.

The proclamation stated: "Whereas, the wearing of the memorial poppy is a fitting and effective way of keeping bright the memory of those young men who gave their lives in America's service in the World War, and

Whereas, men of Hillsboro served gallantly in that war, some being called upon to sacrifice their lives in that service and

Whereas, the present national emergency requires the same type of unselfish patriotism displayed by the men and symbolized by their memorial flower, and

Whereas, the women of the American Legion Auxiliary will distribute veteran-made memorial poppies throughout the city on Saturday, May 24,

"Now, therefore, I, E. A. Griffith, acting mayor of the City of Hillsboro, do proclaim, Saturday, May 24, to be Poppy Day in the City of Hillsboro, and urge all citizens to observe the day by wearing the memorial poppy of The American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary in honor of the men who died for America in the war of 1917 and 1918."

The committee in charge of poppy sales is composed of Mrs. Lois Walsworth, Mrs. Jack West and Mrs. Joe Lester. This committee will be assisted by other Auxiliary members and by Camp Fire girls.

Hillsboro Pair Fly to Obispo

British Repulse Air Invasion Of Greek Island

News of an unsuccessful Nazi air-raid on the island of Crete, east of the fugitive Greek government, and British strength, plus speculative and conflicting accounts of the fate of 322 passengers aboard the Egyptian steamer Zamzam, believed sunk in the south Atlantic, put big type in American news headlines this week.

Wednesday reports from London and Cairo concerning the thwarted Nazi attempt to seize Crete said British and Greek forces were "in complete command of the situation." Death or capture befell every one of the horde of German paratroopers—including some 1500 disguised as Axis soldiers—who landed at the extreme western end of the island, British sources said.

Speedy and effective roundup of the invading troops was hailed by Prime Minister Winston Churchill in a talk before the house of commons. British military sources were quoted in words of assurance that the British imperial and Greek forces on Crete are considered strong enough to successfully defend the island against any airborne attack.

Authoritative military observers labeled the Nazi invasion attempt with air-borne troops "the largest operation of its kind in history." London news sources set the number of troops successfully landed at less than a division.

Probability that the Battle of Crete would continue with "increasing severity" was seen Wednesday by Churchill as persistent reports came through that the Nazi shock troops were still raining down on the island and that bold fighting between the island defenders and invading Nazis was still going on, but the general picture seemed to be that the situation was "in hand."

Coming from Berlin, latest reports on the Zamzam affair stated that all 322 persons aboard the ship were saved and taken by a merchant ship to the German-occupied west coast of France after a Nazi warship had sent the Egyptian liner to the bottom of the south Atlantic, but a shortwave broadcast from London heard in New York termed the German report of all passengers being saved as "utterly fantastic."

Of the 229-ton liner's 322 passengers, 130 were Americans, most of them Protestant and Catholic

missionaries and American field service ambulance drivers and assistants. Cargo of the Zamzam, fertilizer, trucks, automobiles and machinery of various types, was seized and loaded on a German ship before the Egyptian vessel was sunk, according to one Nazi report.

In other major news events of the week, Italian troops in Ethiopia surrendered to the British, repulsion of Nazi air raids on British posts in Iraq, President Roosevelt's call for \$200,000,000 to carry the relief program through another year and a P. G. E. rate shift moving toward abandonment of the time-honored "postage stamp" rate structure in favor of a "locality surcharge" policy which would be based on the Bonneville "objective rate."

A German spokesman declared the ship was sunk because it "carried contraband intended for the enemy."

From Washington, D. C., Wednesday came a report that one of the first objectives of the newly created office of civilian defense will be to recruit a million or more volunteers to man the home defenses in case of any war emergency. Intimations were that this vast army would come from the reservoir of men known to selective service officials as Class 3-A, men deferred because of dependents.

From San Francisco, Cal., Wednesday came a story of 1000 A. F. of L. metal workers being led through picket lines and back to work at three of 11 shipyards closed by a strike of A. F. of L. C. I. O. machinists. The strike is tying up \$30,000,000 in defense contracts.

Some 2000 pickets outside the plants booed and yelled as the workers, led by John P. Frey, president of the metal trades department of the A. F. of L., marched into the plants in files of two, but no violence was reported. Police stood by.

A German demand that the United States withdraw its diplomatic staff from Paris by June 10 for "military reasons" was reported here Wednesday in a dispatch from Vichy, France.

President Roosevelt Tuesday established by executive order an office of civilian defense to be headed by Mayor LaGuardia of New York.

Thanksgiving will be observed the last Thursday in November in 1941, as President Roosevelt has decided that his experiments in changing the date of Thanksgiving have been a failure.

"The young men of our nation today are wondering what is to happen to them," Miss Jensen adds. "Mothers are fearful of what might become of their sons and families are being torn apart. It is well to recall that recreation was originally a part of religion. One's memory of this could be refreshed by reading Matthew 4, which reads 'Man cannot live by bread alone.'"

Recreation Held Vital to Nation As "Nerve Tonic"

Recreation to calm jittery nerves created by the present war situation needs special attention these days, says Miss Izola Jensen, extension specialist in community social organization at Oregon State college. In her work throughout the state Miss Jensen is stressing the value of active recreation which requires "doing" as a means of relieving the tensions brought on by everyday news of destruction and terror, and ruthless murder unloosed upon helpless people.

"To combat the strain of tension and worry man needs activity," says Miss Jensen. "Big muscle activity which is experienced in hiking or taking part in the revived square dances helps to relax tensions and quiet nerves. To keep a mental balance a person needs to develop a physical reserve."

Strength in Outdoors

"We in America need a morale-building recreation. We need to make use of the quiet and strength of the great outdoors, enjoy the beauties of nature, know the charm of music, and gain the poise and confidence that comes through creating a piece of craft with our hands."
