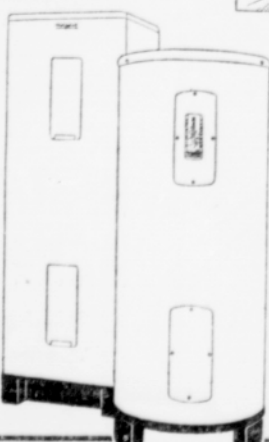
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27 Boy Scouts Get Awards at District Court of Honor

Check on proper visiting hours. Usually Wednesday and Saturday afternoons and Sundays are free time for the men in camps, unless they happen to be on duty. To avoid disappointment a telegram or letter of inquiry in advance of the visit is advisable.

The season for maneuvers has begun and it is wise to make sure that a soldier is going to be in camp at the time of the intended visit.

Machines vs. Jobs

Future generations of Americans are going to be highly amused when they learn that way back in 1941 the machine-age need to be defended. However, as the machine exerts a tremendous influence in modern civilization, it is not surprising that it should be blamed for many of our troubles in time of depression, just as it is credited with our prosperity at other times. It is human to be hasty in judgment and in condemnation.

Almost all of us are conscious of the effect of the machine on our own lives. Most of us have seen industrial development change the kind of food we eat, the clothes we wear, the kinds of houses in which we live, the automobiles and trains in which we ride, and the occupations at which we work. The machine has brought many other changes of which we are not so conscious. In fact, practically every improvement which we enjoy in our modern lives can be found to be linked with technological development. All our modern modes of transportation and communication, without which our present type of business civilization would be impossible, are dependent upon mechanical developments. Back of the machines we daily use, and back of every manufactured product are countless other machines which we do not see—machines that make machines and that help to perfect and produce economically the thousand and one necessities and luxuries of modern life from

our first nursery bottle to our coffin.

The machine has had a vast number of more subtle influences on our habits and customs and our cultural life. For example, the science of animal husbandry has found it necessary to develop new types of hogs and steers to meet the demand for smaller pork chops and roasts because machines have reduced the amount of physical labor performed today. The family of today's worker does not require the 12 and 15 pound cuts of meat at did our wood-chopping ancestors.

The machine has made American civilization. But it did not accomplish this without a struggle by those who were keen enough to realize its value against those who feared it meant man's destruction. Even today, despite the overwhelming evidence confronting us of the benefits that have come from technological changes, there are many Americans inclined to believe the spell-binding orators who picture the machine as a Frankenstein monster about to destroy civilization.

This bogey has scared otherwise intelligent persons into doing some very foolish things. It has made labor organizations strike against working for employers who were reluctant to sign agreements not to install new machinery in textile plants. It has led congressmen to propose legislation forbidding technological advancements. It has impelled men to steal out under cover of night to sabotage road-making machines they foolishly believed were detrimental to them.

History is full of accounts of attacks upon new machines. Many of us can recall the indignation against the automobile which frightened horses off the highway 35 years ago. All kinds of resolutions were passed to abolish what were then called "infernal machines," fortunately without success in most instances.

In subsequent articles which will appear shortly in this newspaper we will discuss further this important subject of "Machines versus Jobs."

PROPER INFLATION
An argument in favor of keeping tires properly inflated is the fact that tires are much more easily damaged when under inflated, according to the Emergency Road Service of the Oregon State Motor Association. Air pressure in tires never should be permitted to drop more than three pounds below factory recommendation.
