

Dr. Giersbach Inauguration Will Feature Three-Day P. U. Program

Inauguration of Walter C. Giersbach as tenth president of Pacific University will highlight that institution's three-day commencement program June 1 to 3, according to detailed plans outlined here this week.

Inaugural exercises will be held at 2:30 p. m. on the campus under the oaks. Homer T. Shaver, chairman of the Pacific university board of trustees, will officiate. Main speakers on the inaugural program will be Governor Charles S. Sprague of Oregon and Dr. Douglas Horton, national minister of the Congregational Christian church.

Prayer will be rendered by Dr. Frank E. Carlson, state superintendent of the Congregational conference of Oregon, and appropriate musical selections will be heard from the Pacific university choir.

Two benedictions, one honoring Dr. Giersbach and the other in honor of visiting alumni, are scheduled for 6:30 p. m. The Giersbach inaugural dinner will be held in MacCormack hall on the campus, with Dr. Arthur Custuman McGiffert, president of the Pacific school of theology, Berkeley, Cal., as main speaker.

The alumni banquet will be held in the Congregational church. Following the banquet, guests at both will meet for a union program under the oaks.

Baccalaureate Sunday

The three-day inaugural commencement program will officially open Sunday at 11 a. m. with baccalaureate services in the Congregational church. Dr. Giersbach is to deliver the sermon. A junior jubilee at 3 p. m. on the campus will include presentation of a new flag and dedication of a new campus.

"Hankie Club" Chain Letters Are Illegal

Postmaster I. T. McPheters this week called attention to federal postal laws which make it illegal to send letters and post cards relating to the so-called endless chains of hankie clubs, apron clubs, towel clubs and similar schemes.

"Patrons of the various postoffices depositing in the mails letters and cards relating to schemes of this nature should be warned that the sending of such matter through the mails is a violation of the postal fraud and letters statutes," McPheters said. "Notices are served upon all violators whose names come to the attention of the department requiring them to show cause why fraud orders should not be issued against them. Such orders forbid the delivery of any mail to the persons named therein."

The nation is being flooded at the present time with such cards and letters, and a few have been inadvertently discovered by clerks in the local office, McPheters said. Cards and letters of this kind when noticed are shipped to Portland, he stated.

Drivers' License Office to Open Here June 4

Residents in this area may obtain driver's license renewals at temporary offices to be established at the courthouse in Hillsboro, according to an announcement from the office of Earl Snell, secretary of state. The office will be open here daily beginning Wednesday, June 4, for the convenience of local residents who wish to renew their driver's license, due before July 1 of this year.

Persons who hold current driver's licenses and who are under 70 years of age may renew their licenses by filling out the application form and paying the fee of \$1.50, it was said.

The only persons required to take the examination under provisions of law are persons 70 years of age and over, those who were not licensed during the period July 1, 1939, to June 30, 1941, and persons with physical disabilities. The Oregon driver's license examination consists of a test on the Oregon motor vehicle laws, an eye test, a test on ability to understand road signs, and the driving demonstration.

Those required to take the examination are advised to inquire at the local office and arrange to contact one of the regular state license examiners in this territory.
