

A. W. Jones Feted on Ninetieth Birthday

HAZELDALE—A. W. Jones was honored on his 90th birthday by a party at the Hazeldale schoolhouse on May 23. The affair was arranged by the Ladies' club, with a few old friends as additional guests. Games and contests were enjoyed, and a special feature of the evening was a large three-tier cake with twenty candles.

Mr. Jones was presented with a sweater by the club, as well as other gifts. Mrs. O. W. Hostetler and Mrs. Kenneth Mills were in charge of arrangements.

Relatives of Mr. Jones present were his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Dick Kelly; his brother, J. P. Jones, and his son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Jones, all of Chehalis Mountain.

Mr. Jones was born in Pennsylvania on May 23, 1851. As a boy he lived in New York, Wisconsin and Iowa. In the year 1882 he and his brother, J. P. Jones set out for Oregon from Sioux Rapids in company with 13 other wagon teams. The Jones outfit was the only one that reached Oregon. The men worked in Pendleton and The Dalles, finally reaching Portland on February 1, 1884. Jones settled in Forest Grove, serving on the town council there in 1888. The work he followed was installing machinery in flour mills all over the Pacific Northwest. When the Jones brothers stilled the mill at Newberg, the town consisted only of two small stores and one residence.

Ten years ago he purchased the store at Hazeldale, which he still operates alone.

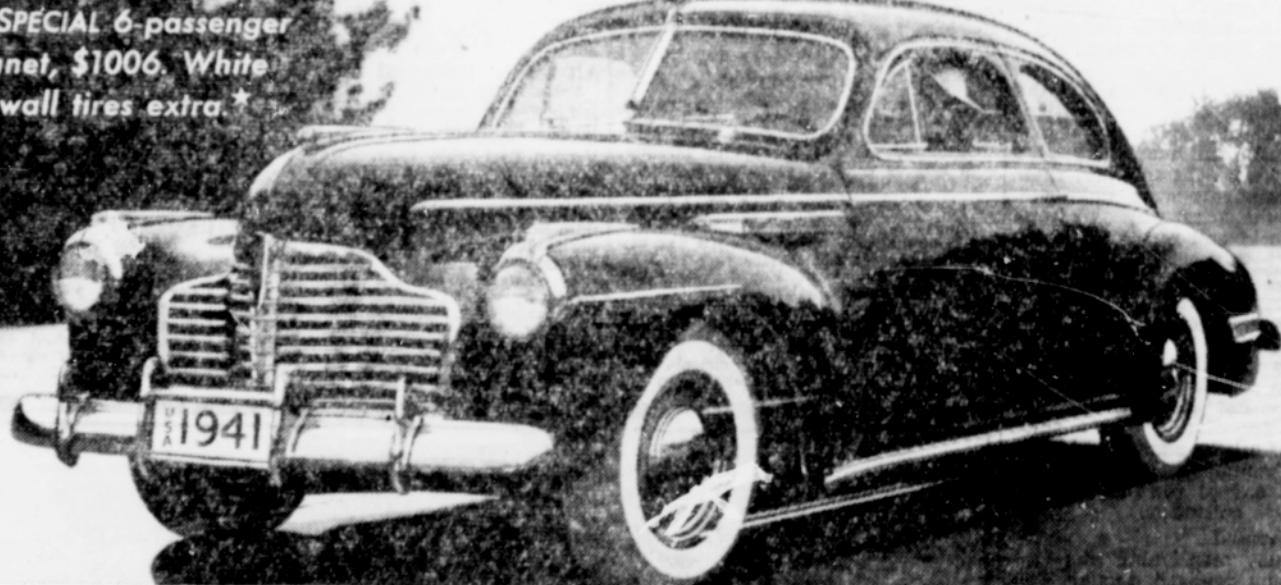
