Dr. Hinds Speaker At Osteopathic Meet

Plans for health and hospital care and industrial hygiene programs to protect workers in expanding defense industries were described by Dr. William E. Hinds of Hillsboro, president of the Oregon Osteopathic association, at the tri-state convention of Oregon, Washington and British Columbia osteopathic associations Wednesday in Tacoma, Wash.

Dr. Hinds said these plans were "worthy ideals, but not likely to succeed unless they contain provisions to prevent political or other third-party control over doctor-patient relationships."

Man Held Here In Death Case

The man was dead. He did not know what time it was, he said, except that the sun was high in the heavens.

Mason's signed statement said, in conclusion: "I absolutely can not remember anything, as I said before, since Slim hit me with the axe but I am sure there was no one else there and I am sure that I did kill him and I am going to take my medicine."

Body Moved
Mason appeared in North Plains early Sunday afternoon and summoned officers to meet him there.

The battered corpse had been dragged some 50 feet into the brush from the scene of the fatal brawl and Mason admitted he had moved the body because he hated to see it lying there. He told officers that he had built a fire and heated some water for coffee and to wash himself after he awakened Sunday.

Police at first seized upon the hatchet as the probable murder weapon but an autopsy report by Dr. Joseph Beeman of the state crime laboratory, describing the death weapon as a blunt clublike instrument, sent officers back to Mason with further questions. Mason then recalled that in seeing a blood-matted pretty limb about three feet long and as big around as his arm at the murder scene on Sunday morning. He split this limb into kindling and used it to build a fire, he told officers.

Blood on Hatchet
There was blood smeared on the hatchet but Mason's statement that he used the axe to split kindling while his hand was bleeding explained this point.

Sheriff J. W. Connell, Deputy Dick Busch, State Officer Al Johnson and Coroner Fred Sewell made an inspection trip to the murder scene Monday but were unable to find any new clues which might explain the case further.
