

Dr. Giersbach Installed as Tenth P. U. Head

Highlighting a combined inaugural commencement program, Dr. Walter C. Giersbach was formally installed as tenth president of Pacific university in a colorful ceremony on the university campus Monday.

Governor Charles Sprague, main speaker at the inaugural, gave a brief talk in which he described religion as furnishing "the moral cement to hold our social order together." Oregon owes its cultural beginning to such early Christian colleges as Pacific university, he said.

Captain Homer T. Shaver, president of the board of trustees of Pacific university, presided at the induction ceremony. Roger Folgate acted as marshal for an academic procession that opened the inaugural.

Religion Stressed

Dr. Giersbach, in accepting his high office, stressed the importance of education that centers in God, declaring that such an institution's prime function is to interpret the teachings of the Almighty. The same vein of thought coursed through a talk entitled "The Church and the School," by Douglas Horton of New York, national minister of the Congregational Christian council.

Dr. Giersbach found many friendly hands extending greetings following his inauguration, among the well-wishers being Dr. Henry F. Price, Pacific dean; Edwin T. Ingles, alumni association president; and Thomas Klink, student body president. Also on the inaugural program were Rev. Jesse W. Bunch, Methodist pastor; Dr. Frank E. Carlson, superintendent of the Congregational conference of Oregon, and the Pacific university choir.

Scott Traces History

Baccalaureate services for the class of 46 graduating seniors were held Sunday morning, followed by a junior jubilee on the campus with Leslie M. Scott, state treasurer, as the main speaker. He recalled the founding and early history of Pacific university.

Commencement exercises on the university campus Tuesday, concluded the three-day program with Dr. Giersbach presenting the 48 degrees, including eight with magna cum laude honors and three with cum laude designations. The honorees were Leo LaMar Bell, Robert J. Dyke, William L. Jackson, Elizabeth R. Kellogg, Maxine M. Reicher, Emma M. Rigby, Mary Elizabeth Smith, and Eleanor Margaret Bender, all magna cum laude, and Arnold Robert Gahler, Thomas Montgomery Gibson and John Ferdinand Staehle, all cum laude.

Pelmer Hoyt, publisher of the Oregonian, in the main commencement day address, entitled "There Will be a Miracle," reminded the Pacific university graduates that there are dark days but expressed hope that France and England will live.

Referring to the days before the fall of France and a talk by former Premier Paul Reynaud in which he said, "If I were told a miracle was needed to save France, I would say, 'I am a believer in miracles.'" Hoyt declared, "I, too, am a believer in miracles... there will be a miracle and you are that miracle—you and the millions like you who are the strength of America; for America is itself a miracle."

Navy Calls for Emergency Enlistments

"Thirty-five thousand additional men are urgently needed for the U. S. navy by June 30," says a bulletin received this week from the recruiting station at Portland. This means that the Portland recruiting district's share based upon population will be approximately 750 to 800 recruits.

Selective service does not apply to the navy. The navy depends upon voluntary enlistments entirely. The term of enlistment in the regular navy is still six years for all men over 18 and under 35 years of age. For men between the ages of 17 and 18 the enlistment is for minority, or until the boy attains his 21st birthday.

For the man who does not want to cultivate himself for six years, the naval reserve offers an attractive proposition. He may enlist in one of the many classes of the Naval Reserve and be released from active duty upon the termination of the present emergency. He may only be called to active duty in certain designated duties and if qualified will be sent to service schools to prepare him for these duties, and as stated before, he will be released from active duty when the emergency is over.

Anytime after the recruit's indoctrination training is over, if he so desires, transfer to the regular navy, and the time spent in the reserve will be computed in the time necessary for retirement. In other words, he obligates himself only for the duration of the emergency and at the same time finds out if he is cut out to be a navy man. When that is decided he may transfer to the regular navy.

Hadley, Epps Attend Seedmen's Conclave

Kaiser Dead; Two Dictators Hold Meeting

Death of Kaiser Wilhelm II, who led the German people in World War I, topped the nation's headlines Wednesday even as the world conjectured where Adolph Hitler, leader of Germans in World War II, will send his Nazi legions to strike next.

Pierce battling for possession of the island of Crete ended this week with Britain evacuating her troops and leaving the important eastern Mediterranean base in German hands. London claimed 20,000 Nazi troops died in attempting to reach Crete by water and that untold thousands of parachutists died.

Losses Great

It was generally admitted by the British, at the same time, that allied losses on the island were great. Some 15,000 troops were successfully carried to Egypt and Berlin claimed capture of 13,000 British. Greek and New Zealand fighters.

Adolph Hitler and his axis partner, Benito Mussolini, met for one of their history-making Brenner pass discussions Monday and widely divergent opinions were rife as to the main topics discussed, but everywhere it was felt that the meeting foreshadowed a new spread of war action by the axis partners.

Iraqis Beaten

Britain was somewhat consoled, meanwhile, with news that her troops had successfully put down the Iraqi uprising and that war preparedness was gathering power for any possible attack on the Suez canal through French Syria, where German troops and motorized units were reportedly gathering.

At Washington, a bill which would give President Roosevelt wartime power to requisition "property of any kind or character" was introduced in the senate by Senator Robert Reynolds and administration leaders were urging its passage.

The strike situation in San Francisco by industries grew more tense with warehouse workers going out at the same time a two-week-old walkout at the Detroit Steel Products company spread to another plant to delay work on steel window and door sashes ordered for army training centers and defense production units. A new strike of 2200 truck drivers in the Pittsburgh area added to national strife and in Portland was harassed with continuation of the bakers' strike and addition of a walkout.
