

Couple Honored on Fiftieth Anniversary

CORNELIUS—Mr. and Mrs. James R. Willey celebrated their golden wedding anniversary Tuesday, June 3. Beloved by all, as they work in their little home and take an active part in the community and church life, they seem very young in both spirit and action. The Willeys live on a small acreage half-mile east of town on the highway. They own their neat, well-kept home surrounded by a pretty yard of green lawn, flowers and shrubs.

Isabella Willey was born in August, 1872, in Clarinda, Iowa, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Bailey. She was one of four children. A sister died when small and Frank and Charles are still living at Clarinda, Iowa.

James Willey was born May 31, 1870, also in Clarinda, Iowa, the son of Mr. and Mrs. David Willey. He was one of three children. Henry, who is now 91, and Tom, another brother, are living in Clarinda. The couple's schooling was in Clarinda.

Their father's farms joined, so that's how it all began. So one spring evening, June 3, 1891, when Isabella was 18 and James 21, she dressed all in white, they went to the Methodist parsonage with Jimmie and bobby and Rev. Thomas Wallace married them. Mrs. Wallace was a witness.

A baby girl was born, who died in infancy in their home town. Later two sons were born there. Walter, unmarried and teaches at Hill Military academy. He is a graduate of State college, New Mexico. Vernon is married to Blanche Duley and they live at Seattle. He has been with the Westinghouse Electric for 17 years as electrical engineer. He is a graduate of the University of New Mexico and is also his wife. They have two children, Elizabeth 13, and Barbara 8.

The Willeys first move was to Big Horn, Wyo., where they spent four years, then to Montana, where they lived close to an Indian reservation, where they had many experiences with the Indians in their buying and selling. Then back to Iowa, then to Texas at Racine, Jacksonville, San Antonio, Mahala, Merita, Springfield, Rockdale, Brenham and Rockwell, New Mexico. From Brenham they came to Portland, Hillsboro, and at Cornelius they stopped.

His occupations were farming, fruit business, oil fields and mining. He still loves mining. Only last year he sold his claim, which he had eight years. It was in the Blue Mountains, east of Utah. Now, he's planning on a trip there soon.

They are members of the local Methodist church, transferring from Rockwell, New Mexico. Mr. Willey's father was a guard in the Mexican war and he tells many things, related to him by his father.

They attend church school every Sunday. Only Sunday, June 1, he put in his 71 pennies and all present enjoyed singing, "Happy Birthday," to him as much as he enjoyed hearing it.

Tuesday evening the members and friends of the church gave the Willeys a lovely surprise, evening at the church. During the day they were surprised with many lovely tokens in honor of the day. Their son Walter was home for the day, but because of business and school, Vernon and his family were unable to be home, but remembered their parents in a special way. The room was decorated in lovely gold roses and gold iris. Lester Moobrey sang, "Believe Me of All These Enduring Young Chances." The first of these demonstrations will be given Saturday, June 7, when the entire process of bread-making will be shown. All Farm Security homemakers and friends are invited to come and learn to improve the quality of home made bread. Good home made bread is economical, wholesome and a satisfaction to any housewife and her family," she added.

Later meetings will deal with canning processes, freezing, methods of food preservation and other home management projects.

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Mrs. Weil to Head Drive Children's Aid Donations

Mrs. R. W. Weil of Hillsboro has accepted the Washington county chairmanship of the appeal to raise funds which will prevent curtailment of services provided by the Boys and Girls Aid society of Oregon, state-wide child-placing and home agency. With organization plans nearing completion, the campaign will get under way immediately.

The children's agency cares for 35 dependent boys and girls, 55 per cent of whom come from counties other than Multnomah. With no funds from private sources provided by any county except Multnomah, it is essential to raise money in the other counties to meet the rising cost of living or agency activities must be curtailed, society officials explain.

The campaign, organized on a state-wide scale, will be conducted in each of the counties. To carry through its program the Boys and Girls Aid needs \$5,000 in voluntary contributions from the 35 counties in which the appeal will be made.

Operated entirely on a foster home plan basis, the Boys and Girls Aid places children under its supervision in private family homes for care. In addition to finding homes for the 35 boys and girls, it furnishes clothing and medical and dental care for them. A clinic is maintained at the administration office, 1904 S. W. 11th, Portland, where children boarding in or near Portland come for periodical examinations and health care. In counties too far distant from headquarters to permit clinic visits by children, local health and medical facilities are used.

Mrs. Harry R. Morgan represents Washington county on the honorary board of the society. C. C. Chapman is president of the organization and Mrs. Myrtle C. Dalziel is state director.
