

OSC Graduation Class Includes 17 Students from Washington County

OREGON STATE COLLEGE.—Washington county was represented at the seventy-second annual commencement June 2 at Oregon State college by 17 students. These graduates are members of one of the largest groups ever to receive degrees in one class at the college. Requirements for the bachelor's degree were completed by 677. In addition, 93 masters' and eight doctor of philosophy degrees bring the total for this year to 780, all earned.

Clifford James Dernbach of Beaverton received a doctor of philosophy degree. Eight constitutes the largest number of doctor of philosophy degrees to be awarded at one time at Oregon State. Dernbach's major is chemistry, and his minors are physical chemistry and physics.

Gets Master Degree

Receiving a master's degree was Daniel William Slater of Tigard. This degree is awarded to students taking graduate work.

Students receiving bachelor's degrees in the school of agriculture were Wilbur Lewis Griebeler of Gaston, Malcolm Julius Johnson of Garden Home, Wesley Linwood Batchelder of Hillsboro, and Marion Lawrence Krumler of Sherwood. They are among the 129 graduates of the school of agriculture.

Among the 79 secretarial science graduates are Virginia Ethel Brodersen, Josephine Hutchens, and Rachelle Anne Reicher of Forest Grove. Miss Brodersen's campus activities included membership in the Associated Women Students, chairman of chaperone committee for the co-operative house dance, "Co-Op," member of house committees on Student Directory selling staff, and yearbook secretary. Miss Hutchens was also a yearbook secretary, a member of Madrigal glee club, and on the Greater Halls tea committee. Miss Reicher was yearbook secretary for two years, Barometer Theatre column writer, archery club, independent student council member, and on the homecoming publicity committee.

Two Nurses
Among the nine nursing education graduates are Helen Elizabeth Haage of Forest Grove and Margaret Ruth Denney of Beaverton, who will receive bachelor of arts degrees. Ralph Erwin Stoffer of Beaverton will receive a bachelor of arts degree in education, and is among the 42 graduates of that school. His activities include member of the ROTC band, president of the fencing club and on the fencing team.

Marybel Rebecca Flint of Beaverton received a degree in the school of science, from which 72 students were graduated. She received senior honors for being among the upper ten per cent of her school's graduating class. (For details on Miss Flint, see story and picture on this page.)

Student leadership and campus activity included the following: Treasurer and later president of the Kappa Delta sorority; Kappa Delta cup, awarded for outstanding leadership and scholarship among sorority members; member of Talons, campus service honor society; member campus etiquette committee; standards committee for sororities on campus; Madrigal club, women's choral group; and the college chorus, composed of men and women's glee clubs. She was a Rock's chancellor, advisor for freshman girls, and received prizes for work on the Lamplighter, campus magazine, and the Beaver, campus yearbook. John Charles Burns, 35, jointly indicted with James DiOrto on a charge of auto theft, withdrew his plea of not guilty and entered a plea of guilty before Circuit Judge R. Frank Peters last week and sentenced to serve a six months term in the county jail with parole at the end of three months. Credit for time already served since his arrest on April 18 was allowed by the court.

James DiOrto, 36, likewise changed his plea and was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary with parole on good behavior.

Robert Rossi, 24, arrested April 16 on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, was sentenced to serve a one-year term in the county jail but paroled for a three-year probation period under supervision of the state parole board.

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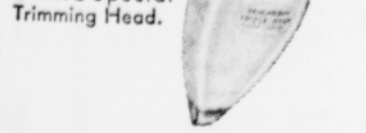
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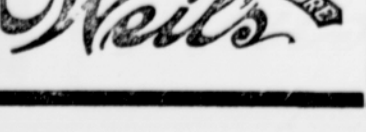
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Arrest of Grove Trio Clears Up 21 Robberies

A series of 21 school robberies, including one at Hillsboro and two at Forest Grove, were cleared up Saturday with arrest of three brothers from Forest Grove, Thomas E. Lloyd, 32; George H. Lloyd, 31, and Raymond P. Lloyd, 26, according to a report from the Clackamas county jail, where the three are being held without bail privileges.

The arrest was made at Vancouver, Wash., after an attempt had been made to sell an expensive clarinet, allegedly stolen from the Canby high school, according to Captain Vayne Gurdane of the Oregon state police. Some of the items included musical instruments, radios, aluminum pots and pans, tools, has been recovered but a number of items have been sold and others were dumped in the
