Some 20 years or more ago, the fashionable Washington hotel on the corner of Third avenue and Main street presented this pleasing park appearance to the rear of the building. A balcony porch running the entire length of the building offered second floor guests a view of spacious lawns and shade trees. The hotel entrance was on the corner where Portland Gas & Coke is now located. An ornate lobby with lavish appointments extended to a dining room on the east end, overlooking the lawn and gardens. On the southern end of the lobby, in space now occupied by a barber shop, was the bar. The kitchen was in the building's far corner. Built in 1911 by J. P. Tammie, the hotel was first leased and operated by William C. Gifford, now in the electrical appliance business here. The hotel dining room was noted for its excellent foods and dinner trips to Hillsboro by Portlanders were not uncommon. News then . . . remember when?

An unusual hobby exhibit built by Crandall Peck, Beaverton high school sophomore, has aroused considerable interest. Four tiny hand-carved ship models have been constructed by the youth, who seems talented in handicraft work. Each model is patterned faithfully after some existing craft. A destroyer is the largest, being one-half inch long, and a seagoing tug measures a mere one-fourth inch. Two freighters are a little less than one-half inch in length.

Crowning achievement of the collection is an airplane one-eighth inch long mounted in a standard flashlight bulb of less than one-half inch outside diameter. All of the tiny ships show minute and painstaking detail, with almost invisible guns, bristling from the decks of the destroyer.

Crandall built his collection during the recent closing days of his freshman year, inspired by a study of boats in connection with the class reading of Treasure Island.

The resolution is quoted: Whereas: The press of the city of Hillsboro, the Catholic Sentinel and the entire press of the state of Oregon have been most gener-

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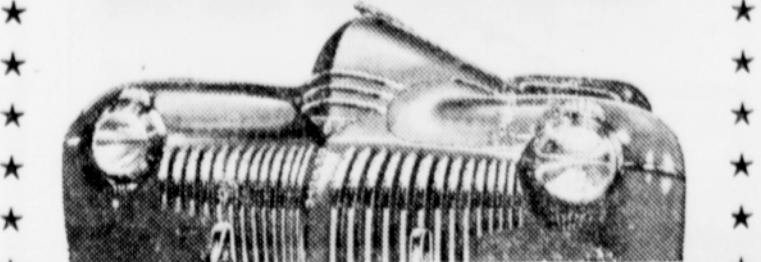
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
