

# David Hill Chapter Holds Flag Day Meet

David Hill chapter, D. A. R., held a "guest day" meeting and program in observance of Flag Day Monday afternoon at the home of Mrs. L. C. Mosberry with her aunt, Mrs. J. C. Hare of Portland, as assisting hostess.

Mrs. J. W. Kelley, chapter regent, presided at the business meeting which was devoted to reports of chairmen on the year's activities.

The musical program included several violin solos by Mary Rae Mann and a capella duets by Frances Campton and Barbara Barrows. Mrs. J. C. Hare, historian of the chapter, introduced Mrs. Charles M. Johnson, a Hillsboro resident, as a descendant of the family of David Hill, for whom the city of Hillsboro was named and for whom the D. A. R. chapter was named. Miss Barbara Moore, granddaughter of Mrs. Charles Johnson, was introduced as the chapter's candidate for Goddess of Liberty.

Mrs. Hare also exhibited some interesting pioneer relics and gave their history. These articles included a framed piece of flag carried by her great-grandfather, Benjamin Ingrall, in the war of 1812 and a piece of a bodysuit worn by one of her ancestors. She also exhibited a coat-of-arms of her family, the Bothwells, who were in Scotland in 1163, during the reign of King David; a copy of a plantation deed of William Caster, her great-grandfather, dated 1733, in New Jersey; a picture of Washington Guards, organized in 1862, one of which was her father, James Bothwell, a pioneer of 1852. Other pictures shown were the house of Betty Ross in which the first flag was made, and some pressed delicacies, the floral emblem of Switzerland.

Miss Alice Sewell, a Portland artist, formerly of Hillsboro, told of her work and exhibited a plaque of the late W. D. Hare father of W. G. Hare, Mrs. M. Mann and Mrs. Harriet Morgan. She also exhibited some plaques of Timberline Lodge and presented them to the hostesses.

Tea was served at a nicely appointed table, following the program.
