Busch Garage Completes New Recap Service

New tire recapping department of the A. H. Busch Service Garage in Hillsboro was completed this week at a cost of approximately \$8000 to make the plant of this 18-year-old Hillsboro firm among the most modern in the nation.

This is the first installation of its kind in northern Oregon and only the fifth in the state and an exclusive franchise in Washington county of the Vitacap process of recapping tires has been awarded the local firm.

Production facilities were increased to meet the growing demand for tire recapping, said A. H. Busch, proprietor.

Steam for the recapper is provided by a gas-fired high-pressure 10-horsepower steam boiler.

After the tires are cleaned, with the old rubber on the top taken off, a sheet of raw uncured rubber, called "camel back" in the trade, from 14-32 to 25-32 inch in thickness, is placed in the steam chamber—which has a capacity of eight average size tires—where it revolves on a roller which touches the inside of the tire.

After the tire is heated, the metal touches the live rubber.

At a temperature of 290 degrees, the new live rubber is fused into the fabric and rubber of the old tire becoming an inseparable part of it. The fusing process requires four minutes for each thirty-second inch of the thickness of the "camel-back" or from about an hour to two hours. The finished tire can then be grooved on a special machine for any tread design desired.

The equipment will handle any size tire from a bicycle tire to a truck tire—300 by 24 to 1350 by 20.

The Service garage has been in its present location for 3 years. It began as a small tire shop with little space and no payroll outside of the owners. Now it has a payroll of 11 persons. Walter E. Busch handles the tire recapping department. Mrs. A. H. Busch is the office manager.

Non-Jury Trial Opens

A non-jury trial, with verdict resting solely upon Judge R. Frank Peters, opened yesterday morning in a circuit court case, the state vs. Sekichi Uyesugi.

A grand jury indictment was turned in April 24 declaring that Uyesugi should be tried on a count of "burning with intent to injure the insurer." Action arose following burning of Uyesugi's home in southeast Washington county.
