U. S. Demands Removal of Nazi Consul Officers

U. S.-Nazi diplomatic relations became further strained this week when the United States demanded the closing of all German consulates and three semi-official Nazi agencies in this country by July 10. The action was taken to curb Nazi propaganda and other subversive activities.

It was considered certain that Germany would retaliate promptly, at least by forcing the remaining American consular officials out of the Reich and German-occupied territory. Some reliable German quarters said Wednesday that if relations between Germany and the United States deteriorate further, the Reich probably will take some more drastic action.

Freeze Axis Funds

Italian and German funds were frozen in this country by order of President Roosevelt and Italy immediately retaliated with similar action. Meanwhile the Italian press is trying to bring denunciations of the U. S. charging this nation with being an aggressor.

War action in Africa stepped up with British forces knocking into Libya for 40 miles. However, German and Italian commands were falling back after a violent three-day battle in the desert around Salum, Egypt. In Syria the British and Free French advanced during the week, but were meeting hard resistance from Vichy dominated French forces.

All 35 missing survivors of the torpedoed American freighter Robt. in Moor were landed at Capetown, South Africa, Monday night by a British ship which happened to see their lifeboats after they had drifted 13 days on the hot mid-Atlantic.

On the U. S. Labor front striking members of the C. I. O. International Woodworkers of America in Washington voted overwhelmingly to accept a defense mediation board proposal which would send them back to work immediately in 33 northwest lumber camps and mills. However, members of the striking A. F. of L. and C. I. O. machinists' unions in San Francisco voted to continue their five-week-old strike against 11 bay area shipyards.

Oregon State Federation of Labor in convention at Astoria took a firm stand against defense strikes. A resolution was adopted without reference to a committee which demanded "support of President Roosevelt and his commissions and their efforts to stop needless wage and hour strikes in national defense industries." The federation also went on record favoring a wage and hour law for Oregon.

Senator Walter E. Pearson of Portland, former state treasurer, died suddenly yesterday while on a trip to Marshfield.
