

Women to Broadcast Tonight "Via Proxy"

Four Hillsboro women will hear themselves defeating a team of four Portland women in a radio traffic safety quiz broadcast over station KOIN, Portland, tonight (Thursday.)

Here's the way it happened: The four Hillsboro women, Mrs. Mabel Grass, Mrs. Gordon Sahnaw, Mrs. Isabel Warren, and Etta Mae Wells, were invited to represent their organization, the Hillsboro Business and Professional Women's club in the contest with the Portland Altruza club. The program is part of the traffic safety educational program conducted by Earl Snell, secretary of state.

Due to the fact the master of ceremonies for the quiz program could not be in Portland tonight for the broadcast, the two teams went to Portland last week and recorded the program. Thus, as it will actually be broadcast tonight at 10:30 o'clock during the regular hour for this show, the participants will sit at home and hear themselves over the air.

The Hillsboro team scored 120 points against 115 for their Portland opponents. They will receive a framed certificate of award, presented by Secretary of State Snell. Questions in the safety quiz concerned traffic situations in the two cities represented in the contest and other safety topics of general interest. Many of the questions were related to the new Oregon speed law, which became effective Saturday, June 14.

Hillsboroans Home From 3400-Mile Trip to Canada

Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Wilkes and Mrs. Harry Christensen returned last week from a 3400-mile trip by auto which took them to Calgary, Medicine Hat, Brooks and Lethbridge, Canada; Montana, Yellowstone park and Idaho.

They left here on May 28th and drove to Grand Coulee, Wash., where the first night was spent visiting with Ward Wilkes (a former Hillsboro boy) who is employed by the construction company that is building the Grand Coulee dam. Ward obtained a permit from the government and the visitors were shown the entire dam. It is a most wonderful piece of construction they say, and will be a great asset to the country which now is a big prairie. Thursday they drove to Canada via Spokane. "We were told we would have a little trouble getting into Canada, but when we reached the border they were more than glad to let us in. We entered Canada at Kings Gate," said one of the party. Spent the night in Cranbrook, B. C., where the auto park is owned by the city and has very nice cabins and a swimming pool. The town was very gaily decorated with flags as they had just celebrated Queen Victoria's birthday a few days before. It was especially noticed that the American flag was flown with the Canadian flag on these occasions.

At MacLeod, B. C., there is a large airbase where 1300 boys are being trained as flyers. In Calgary there is another base where the same amount are being trained.

At Brooks, Alberta, Canada, a three-day visit was made with Mrs. Sarah Emrick and daughter, Mrs. Stella Bonner, aunt and cousin of Mr. Wilkes. Mrs. Emrick and daughter were residents of Hillsboro and vicinity for many years. They live on a large farm near Brooks. The farmers are looking forward to a large crop this year as they have had more rain than usual. "It rained every day we were in Canada which made the roads very bad," said the travelers. Prices have gone up very high since the war and this is noticeable to tourists. There is a heavy tax on all things. Came back into the United States at Coats, Alberta. "The U. S. Customs officers were not so free in letting us back in our own country, but you don't need a passport, as we were told we would have to have."

In Montana they saw lots of oil wells in operation. They are owned mostly by the big oil companies. Stays in Montana included Shelby, Wolf Point, and Billings. Visited Fort Peck dam at Glasgow, Mont., the largest dirt built dam in the world. At Wolf Point the travelers were almost to the North Dakota line. This is one of the many Indian reservations in Montana. They have their own trading places where they can buy what they want, many of them owning modern equipment, such as refrigerators, stoves and radios. Crops all through the state should be fine because of all the rain they have had. Went into Yellowstone National park through the northeast entrance at Cooke, Mont. They had to drive right over the top of the Rocky mountains though the snow which was on both sides of the highway. It had snowed the night before and the snow plow was busy opening the road.

At the summit they were 12,000 feet high. Two days in the park were very enjoyable. There were tourists there from every state in the U. S. excepting Louisiana, Georgia and North and South Carolina. This was said to be a beautiful spot and such a lot of wild animals that can live such a carefree life away from the hunter's gun. The tourist accommodations are very good and prices are reasonable. The night's stay was made at Old Faithful Geyser. Like all the rest of the trip it rained part of both days there.

From Yellowstone to Hillsboro the stops were Pocatello, Idaho, and La Grande, where the night was spent with Dr. Lewa Ager and family, a daughter of Mr. Wilkes. "Our trip down the Columbia river and through Eastern Oregon was lovely, but the climax of our entire trip was coming on the Mt. Hood loop to see the lovely rhododendrons in full bloom, also the squaw flowers. We tried to practice safety first so we arrived home safe and sound and mighty glad we live in Oregon," reported the travelers.

Red Cross Sponsors Nurses' Institute From July 7 to 19

An outstanding institute will be conducted by Myrna C. Campbell, R. N., of San Francisco, representative of the Pacific Coast branch of the American Red Cross, July 7-19, at the Multnomah chapter headquarters in the Myler building, 314 Southwest Ninth avenue, Portland. The institute is primarily for married nurses who are not actively engaged in any nursing service. Classes will be held each day from 10 a. m. until noon and from 1 until 4 p. m. There will be no registration fee.

The purpose of this institute is the instruction of nurses who desire to teach the Red Cross Home Nursing Course in their home communities. There will be both demonstration and practice teaching. Only graduate nurses who have had four years of high school and are eligible for regular or Home Defense Red Cross enrollment are encouraged to attend. The institute should not be crowded with persons who cannot later be authorized to teach.

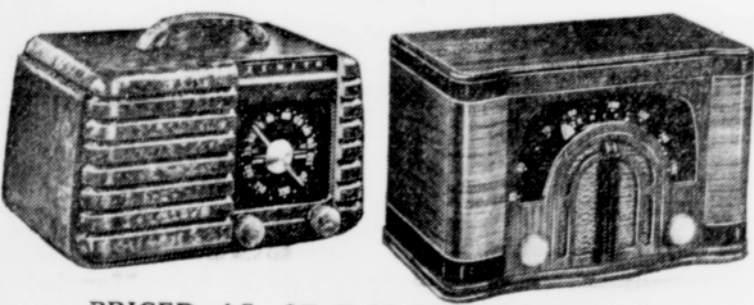

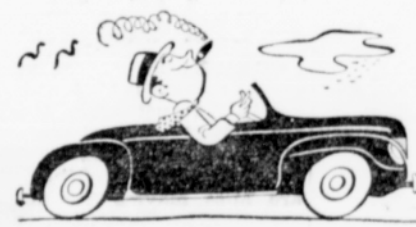

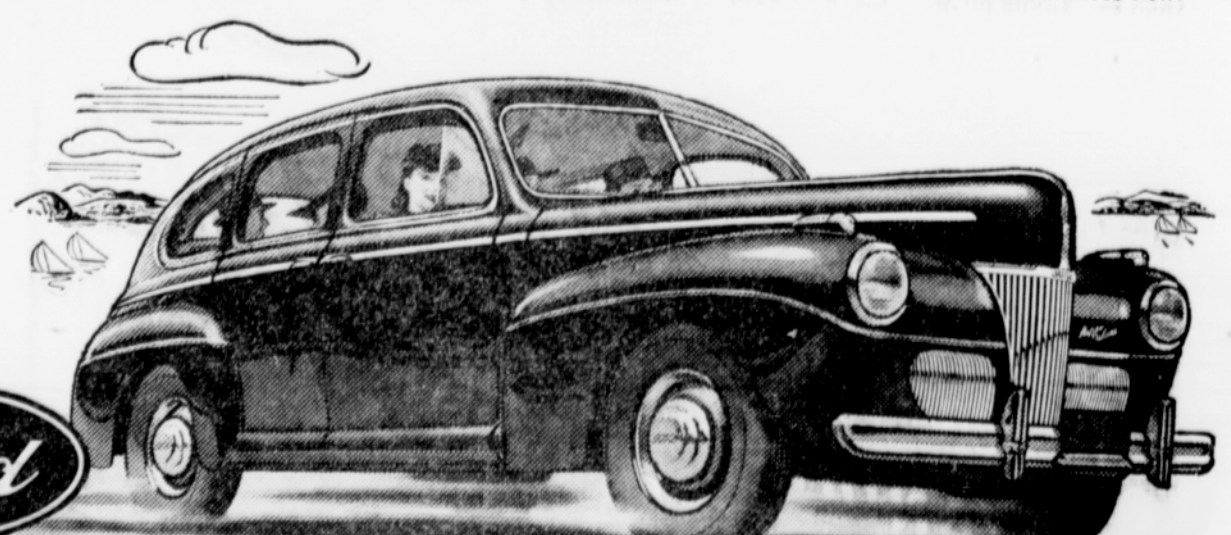
