

S. S. S. Rainbow Crew to Leave On Inland Cruise Saturday

One of the biggest events of the year as far as local Sea Scouting is concerned comes Saturday morning when members of the S. S. S. Rainbow company pack their belongings and leave by truck from Portland for Bellingham, Wash.

The week following their arrival in Bellingham, the Rainbow crew will spend aboard the Activian, a 50-foot motor sail boat. A regular crew will be mustered and watches assigned to approximately 20 men of the Portland area council, who are making the cruise.

When the Activian shoves off on its inland tour eight Hillsboro men from the S. S. S. Rainbow and two Forest Grove representatives will be aboard. Making the trip will be Dick Gates, Don MacKenzie, Dick Schoultz, Bill Cyrus, Robert Bristol, Ernest Helweg, Bud Hoeffel, Robert Weil, all of Hillsboro, and Lawrence Stringer and Howard McGraw of Forest Grove.

The Activian cruise will start sometime Sunday morning and traveling by inland water routes, the Scouts will sail as far north as the "Princess Louise Inlet." The cruise will end at Bellingham the following Saturday.

The crew will be composed entirely of Sea Scouts of not less than ordinary rank and officered by a licensed skipper of the Seattle area council.
