Illness Strikes As Man Seeks to Answer His Call

SCHOLLS—The spirit of true American patriotism was personified by a former Scholls young man last week when he almost lost his life in his effort to answer the call made by his local draft board. Howard McCann, son of Mr. and Mrs. James McCann of Scholls, is ill in a Baker hospital, but recovering from a critical illness suffered during his attempt to hitch-hike to Baker, after he had been released from a La Grande hospital.

Young McCann has been away from Scholls for some years, and has been working in the timber near La Grande. When he received notice to appear at the draft board last May, he started for that place on foot, but, already ill, he collapsed, and was taken to the La Grande hospital by a state police officer who discovered his plight. Worried about his call, however, McCann left the hospital in the night, and by the time he reached Baker, his condition was serious. At St. Elizabeth's hospital, listed as "Pete" McCann, and too ill to give any information about himself, the young man steadily grew worse.

Through the hospital, and the Red Cross, every effort was being made to trace his relatives. A clue led to Hillsboro as his birthplace, and inquiries were made of his parents here, who having no knowledge of a "Pete" McCann, were not concerned at first, as there are a number of people by the same last name living in the county. As the calls became more insistent, through the Red Cross, the sheriff and county welfare office, his mother became alarmed and sent a description directly to the hospital asking for complete information. VanDorn Elected Banks Director; Budget Approved

BANKS—Annual school meeting was held Monday night when John Van Dorn was re-elected director for a term of three years and Mrs. Fred Bovee was re-elected clerk. Only eight people including the school board and clerk were present at the meeting. The budget for the year ending June, 1942, was passed and is as follows: estimated expenses—general control \$38, principal's salary, \$1125; three teachers' salary \$3170; operation of plant \$320; maintenance and repair, \$350; auxiliary agencies, \$30; fixed charges, \$110; capital outlay, \$125; debt service \$25; total estimated expenses \$3873; total estimated receipts \$3866.72. This leaves a balance of \$206.28 to be raised by district taxes. The school clerk reported 230 children of school age in the district.

The legality of his excuse for his delay in answering the summons established, the boy was made happy by the prospect of being received into the army as soon as he is recovered sufficiently. However, he will probably have to remain in the hospital for another three weeks. His mother, Mrs. McCann, plans to make a visit to her son in a few days, and if possible, will bring him home to convalesce.

Scouts Open Work For 1941 Camporee

Preliminary plans for this year's Boy Scout Camporee have already begun. B. B. Richards, chairman of the camporee committee, who is working with John West, Sea Scout leader, announced that the camporee, an annual feature of the Hillsboro Boy Scout year, will take place September 19 and 20 at Shute park. Events similar to those of previous programs will be staged but on a considerably enlarged scale, Richards said.

Troops have already started individual work and training, he revealed. Competition will be spread over first aid, signaling, fire-building, knot-tying, fire building and water boiling, nature study, judging, mapping, pup tent pitching, cooking, general camping, and campfire stunts.

Scouts will be judged, in addition to skill in the different events, on the per cent of their troop which is present. Richards said that all Scouts will participate in at least two events.

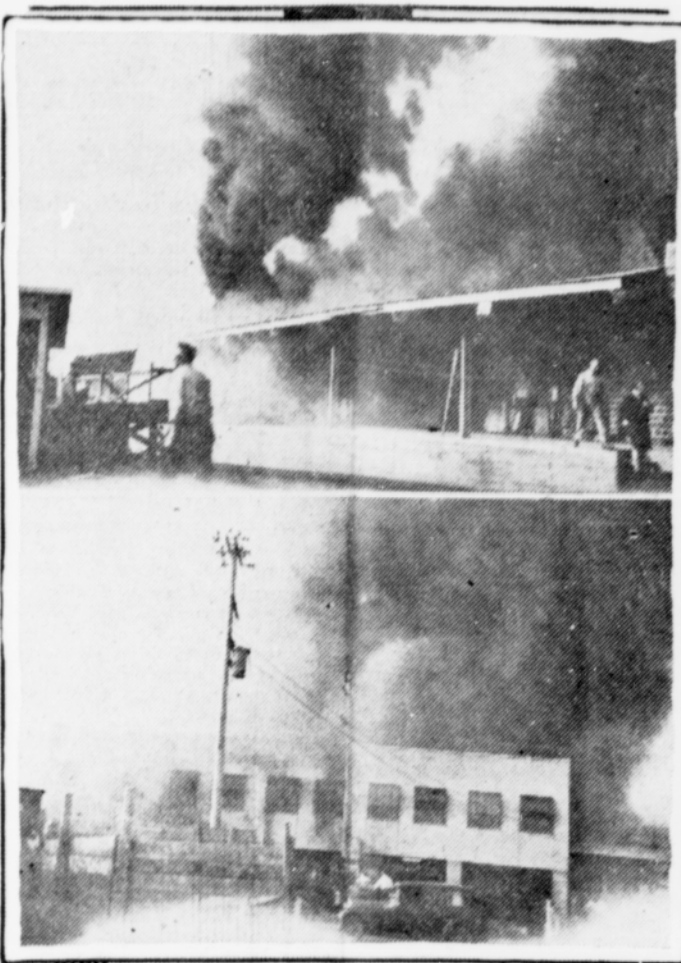
New Scoutmasters' Course Starts in Fall
