The new construction is located on Perry Avenue, and is white on the inside and outside with green trimmings. CPT Enrollment Date Set Up to Middle July

Men between the ages of 19 and 28 will have until sometime in the middle of July to sign for summer CPT airplane instruction. Ed Ball, flight instructor at the local airport, announced last week.

Ball said that there are still only seven students officially signed out of a required starting class of 12 but that possibly one more person is "on the way."

Instruction would last from the middle of July to approximately September 30. Students would pay only charges for examinations prior to their acceptance in the course but would have no actual costs for flight work.

City Adds Pump, Well for "Safety"

Water shortage need hold no more for Hillsboro residents with completion of the city's new pump and well in a section one mile west of Cornelius, J. W. Barney, city manager, announced this week.

The new reserve source was tested last Thursday, pumping at the rate of 18,000 gallons of water per hour, and Barney said that a minimum of 12,000 gallons of water could be maintained.

The well will be used to augment Hillsboro's present gravity supply in case of shortage. Barney indicated that there was still a large supply coming from the dam at present and that there was no sign of "running out."

First step in the new setup was taken one year ago when the well was bored. The pump was installed recently.
