First Plane: News Then . . . Remember When?



To a world in which gleaming metal air monsters have become commonplace, the craft pictured above seems a relic out of the dim, dim past. But it wasn't so long ago—in the summer of 1928—that Hillsboro was all agog about this streamlined beauty. The plane belonged to the late Dr. Elmer Smith, Hillsboro's first aviator, who is seated in the cockpit. The ship, known as an Air King, a three-seater, was a familiar sight over Hillsboro for several years. To Dr. Smith incidentally, Hillsboro owes its early aviation history. He originally purchased the 100-acre tract on which the present municipal airport is located with the express purpose in mind of developing the land into an aviation field.
