Opera House: News then . . . Remember When?



It was 'way back in the 1880's, according to Hillsboro old-timers, that the first timbers were raised for this venerable building, shown in the process of being torn down just three years ago this month. Originally built as a livery stable, the structure in later years was enlarged with several additions, including construction of an upper story which was used for all the community's big social events. The building accordingly came to be known as the "Old Opera House." In later years, it served as quarters for the "Used Car Exchange." A service station now stands on the Second and Washington corner. Much of Hillsboro's old-time romance was recalled when the imposing frame structure fell prey to a wrecking crew in 1938. 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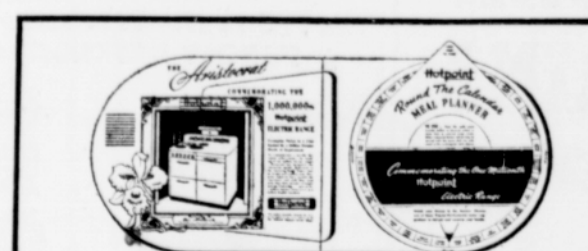
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
