Civilian Defense Enrollees to Fill Out Questionnaire

(See story on page one, section one. Enrollment forms to be filled out at civilian defense registration centers throughout the county during the week starting Monday, July 11, are already being distributed.)

In addition to purely statistical information, the forms include a number of questions of which the following are typical: Have you a car available for use? Relatives in foreign countries? Do you speak any foreign language? Do you possess firearms? Are you willing to be fingerprinted?

Separate Forms
Separate forms will be filled out by men and women. The questionnaire for men will ask experience in any of the following fields: Police, fire department intelligence service, first aid, telephone, teletype, radio, draftsman, clerical, stenographer, typist, other employment.

The corresponding civilian experience list for women includes: Nursing, first aid, nutrition, agriculture, telephone switchboard, teletype, clerical, stenographer, typist, instructor in any field, other employment. Women will also be asked: Number of evacuees you could accommodate in your home, if necessary?

Men will be asked to indicate their preference for service in the following general fields: Police reserve, fire department reserve, first aid, aircraft observer, air raid warden, other service.

Women will indicate preference among the following: Assistant fire warden, first aid, home economics, aircraft warning, recreation, motor corps, instructor in any of following: home nursing, accident prevention, swimming, first aid, nursery school, recreation, nutrition, domestic science.

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Distributors Ask Advance in Price Of Milk, Cream

Recommended advances in the retail price of milk and cream will be submitted to the Washington county Market Milk association, organized Tuesday evening at a meeting of some 30 Washington county dairymen and milk distributors.

The price schedule asks for raises in every bracket of milk and cream except for coffee cream in half-pints, which is recommended to remain the same at 15 cents. The recommended schedule follows:

Car Hits Pole; Power, Light, Phones Quit
Power in Hillsboro and Reedville and telephone service over a wide area in Washington and neighboring counties was disrupted temporarily Wednesday afternoon when a car driven by Adolph Abendroth of Glenwood crashed into a power pole, taking out a 25,000-volt high line, a 2,500-volt feeder line for the city of Hillsboro and trunk lines of the telephone system.

Abendroth, reporting to Miss Evelyn Pasley at the Portland General Electric office here a few minutes after the accident, stated he "must have fallen asleep at the wheel." The mishap occurred on the corner of Tenth avenue and Baseline street.

A trouble-shooting crew of the P. G. E. company found a tangle of wires awaiting them when they arrived on the scene for repairs. Meanwhile, power was shunted in by another route and service was restored to Reedville within 20 minutes. The city of Hillsboro was without light and power for one hour and ten minutes.

The disruption of telephone service deadened communication between Washington county communities and Portland.
